TOWN COUNCIL

The new Town Council was organized on Monday, Feb. 4th. All the councillors with the mayor, filed their qualification papers and were sworn in with the exception of Coun. J. W. Gallagher who was absent from town.

His Worship Mayor Burt addressed the Council as follows:

To the Members of the Town Council: We find we have a change of two seats, Councillors Fisher and Flemming.

Councillor Fisher's health would not permit him to be a candidate for re-election, and it is only fitting to say that Councillor Fisher has been one of the busy men of our town, who was always ready to stand for what was right and anything for the betterment of our town. And now while he is laid by with illness this Council will look forward with hopes of his recovery.

Councillor Flemming was a young man who was willing to do his part one year ago by being one to help look after the affairs of the town, where his interests are. But owing to the change in his business, caused him to retire.

Speaking of the Council of 1917 as a whole they were fair, conscientious and business like men, and always had the best interests of the town in view.

We want to thank our reporters who have been so faithful and exercised so much patience and have been so fair and considerate, while the Councillors in their best judgment conducted affairs.

We are pleased to know that the vacancies have been filled with two as busy men as we have, who are always at the head of the list of anything that has a tendency for the improvement of the Town of Woodstock or for the betterment of society.

With the coming year's work in view that is to come before the Council I feel confident with the six of us good, if not the best, business men of the town, the business will be done with economy and satisfaction to all.

A petition from R. L. Phillips for the erection of a gasoline tank was referred to the street committee.

The case of Foster McIntyre, who is mentally in bad condition, now in the county jail, was discussed, and it was left to the poor commissioner to make further inquiries. There seems to be a doubt as to where he has acquired a residence, whether in Houlton, Me., the Parish of Northampton, or the town of Woodstock. A letter was read from Sheriff Foster on the subject.

A letter was read from J. H. Cluff, protesting against the renewal of the billiard license to R. S. Welch. Referred to license committee.

Moved by Coun. Smith, seconded by Coun. Fewer, that a committee of the whole Council meet and discuss with the engineer a re-arrangement of the water rates generally and report back to the Council. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Stevens seconded by Coun. Brown, that James Brown, head lineman for the Western Union Telegraph Co., be appointed caretaker of the fire alarm system at a salary of \$150 a year.

Supt. Fields, the present caretaker, addressed the board on the subject.

Settlement deferred until Friday evening.

Messrs R. L. E. Allingham, principal assessor, P. Bradley and George Jackson, assistant assessors, were appointed at the same salary as last year.

Coun. Leighton, as chairman of the finance committee, objected to the treasurer paying over any money to any councillor, without an order passing through the Council. There were certain items he could pay, such as freight, express, feed for the town horses, but he had no right to withdraw any money for the payment of wood.

Coun. Fewer explained that the money withdrawn was not strictly speaking town money, but money left by the people for the payment of wood when the cars of wood arrived by train.

Coun. Leighton said he was opposed to the wood scheme from the very first and was still opposed to it.

Coun. Smith—I am and was opposed to the town going into the wood business from the very first. We have no more right to go into the wood business than to go into the grocery business.

FRIDAY EVENING

His Worship Mayor Burt and Couns Stevens, Smith, Fewer and Leighton were present. Coun. Gallagher was in Boston and Coun. Brown was sick.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved, after the printing department was added to the finance and audit committee.

Moved by Couns Fewer and Smith that the traffic by-law prepared by the clerk be ratified and that we ask for the necessary legislation to make it effective.

Carried.
