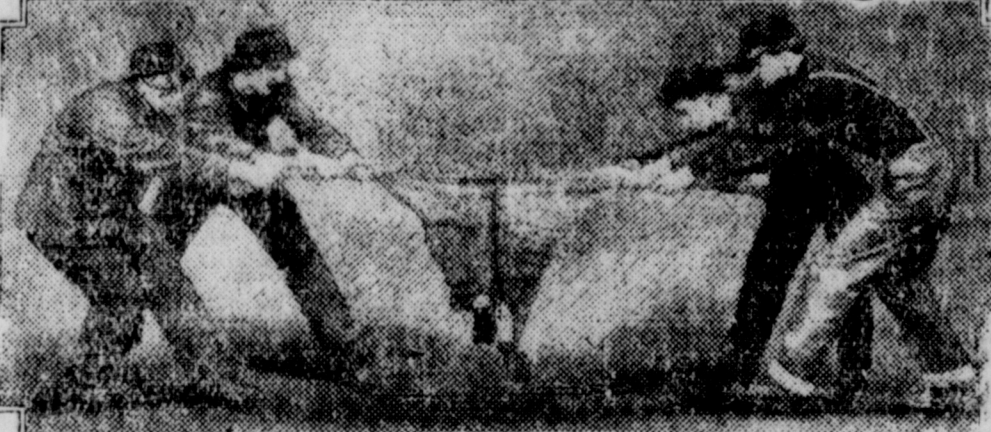

#### Major J. J. Bull Arrives Home

Major J. J. Bull arrived home Saturday from the front. He enlisted first in 1914 and attended Valcartier camp with the first contingent as a musketry instructor with the 12th Battalion. Upon their arrival in England the 12th was made a reserve battalion and after two months at Salisbury Plains Major Bull returned to Canada. He assisted in the recruiting and training of the 55th Battalion in the fall of 1915, and when it was up to strength he proceeded to England. With the breaking up of the 55th to reinforce other battalions, Major Bull was sent to the 26th as O. C. of the machine gun section. While in Belgium with the 26th Battalion, Major Bull marched with it to the Somme; went through that "show" and returned with the battalion to the Lens area. He was taken ill over a year ago and was invalided to England. He spent four months in the London General Hospital and after leaving there, owing to the state of his health, was attached to a forestry battalion. Following this he became identified with the Royal Flying Corps, constructing aerodromes. After following this work for some time he was summoned before a medical board and pronounced unfit for general service. He has had varied experiences in many lines of war activity and is now, after a fine record with the C. E. F., invalided home. Major Bull shows plainly the effects of his war experiences, but it is hoped that in his home surroundings he will regain his former health and strength.

#### Mr. William McIntyre

The death took place at St. John's, N. B., on Wednesday January 30th, of Mr. Wm. McIntyre, of Richmond Corner, at the age of 81 years.

The remains were brought to Richmond Corner and burial took place on Monday in the graveyard of the Anglican Church of St. John. The service being conducted by the Rev. John Rees-Jones, Rector of Richmond. Mr. McIntyre resided in Richmond for the major portion of his life, where he possessed a flourishing blacksmith's business. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. McIntyre, Campell Settlement, and a member of the McIntyre family so well known and respected in this neighbourhood. Deceased was a loyal Churchman and always took the keenest interest in the work of the Church. He is survived by his widow Mrs. McIntyre and one daughter Mrs. Lombard of Searsport Maine. A large circle of old friends attended the funeral and the chief mourners were Mrs. McIntyre widow, Mrs. Lombard daughter, Mrs. Bull sister, Messrs Woodbury and Bert McIntyre nephews, Mr. and Mrs. Jamieson, Mr. and Mrs. Fleming, Mr. and Mrs. Haines.

#### Mrs Wm Karnes, Sr

On Monday evening, February 18, Mrs. Wm. Karnes died at her home here, aged 71 years. She was well known to the older residents as she and her late husband for very many years had charge of the poor house and farm, where they were liked by the inmates and had the confidence of the town officials. She is survived by one son, Wm at home, and one daughter, Mrs. Jack Townsend of Saskatoon. The funeral was held on Wednesday morning from her home to St. Gertrude's church where a high mass of requiem was celebrated by Rev. J. J. Ryan and burial made in Catholic cemetery. The pall bearers were Alex. Beaton, U. R. Hanson, John Thibodeau and Hugh Nugent.

#### Mrs. Martha Storm

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 14—The death of Mrs. Martha Storm took place yesterday. She had been a sufferer from heart trouble, which for the last three weeks has been of a serious nature. Mrs. Storm was formerly Miss Forbes, sister of the late John Temple and Greeno Forbes, well known citizens of Moncton. Of this family she was the last. She is survived by one son, D. Velvern Storm, of Woodstock, formerly of Fredericton, and one daughter, Miss Kate, who has lived with her mother.

#### Military Wedding At North Sullivan

West Sullivan, Me., Feb. 24.—The church at North Sullivan was the scene of a very pretty wedding on Monday evening at 7 o'clock when Florence Carolyn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar J. Hysom, was united in marriage to Gunner Penrose Harrison MacKinnon, of Woodstock, N. B. At the opening measures of the wedding march played by Mrs. Howard Harvey the bridal party entered the church in the following order: The bridesmaid Miss Marjorie Liscomb, of Bar Harbor, and the groomsmen, E. Morton Hovey of West Sullivan; the bride on the arm of her father; the matron of honor, Mrs. Eugene Ashe and the groom, and Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Abel. The officiating clergyman, Rev. Geo. Sparks of the Methodist church preceded the party from the church door to the altar where he very impressively pronounced the marriage service. The bride was becomingly dressed in a cadet, blue taffeta travelling dress with white fur trimmings and a close white hat and carried a bouquet of white roses. The bridesmaid also wore a travelling suit and carried white roses. The groom, who is a gunner in the 65th Battery, Canadian field artillery, wore his uniform, and the groomsmen, who is in the coast patrol service also wore his uniform and these two young men each representing a branch of his nation's defense presented a very striking picture especially at this time.
