

Major J. J Arrives Home

Major J. . !. Bull arrived home Satur day from the front. He enlisted first in 1914 and attended Valcartier camp with the first cortingent as a musketry in structor with the 12th Battalion. Upon their arrival in England the 12th was made a reserve battation and after two months at Salisbury Plains Major Bull returned to Canada. He assisted in the recruiting and training of the 55th Bat talion in the fall of 1915, and when it was up to strength he proceeded to Eng land. With the breaking up of the 55th to reinforce other battations, Major Bul Was sent to the 26th as O. C. of the machine gun section. While in Belgium with the 26th Battalion, Major Bull marched with it to the Somme; went through that "show" and returned with the battaiion to the Lens area, He was taken ill over a year ago and was invalided to England, He spent four months in the London General Hos pital and after leaving there, owing to the state of his health, was attached to a forestry bartalion. Following this he became identified with the Royal Flying Corps, constructing aerodromes.

After following this work for some time he was summoned before a med ical board and pronounced unfit for general service. He has had varied experiences in many lines of war activ ity and is now, after a fine record with the C. E. F., invalided home. Major Bull shows plainly the effects of his war experiences, but it is hoped that in his home surroundings he will regain his former health and strength.

Mr. William McIntyre

The death took place at St. John, N un wednesday January 30th, of Mr Wm. McIntyre, of Richmond Corner, at the age of 81 years.

The remains were brought to Rich mond Corner and burial took place on Monday in the graveyard of the Anglican Church of St. John. The service being conducted by the Rev. John Rees-Jones. Rector of Richmond. Mr. McIn tyre resided in Richmond for the major portion of his life, where he possessed a flourishing blacksmith's business. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. I. McIntyre, Campell Settlement, and a member of the McIntyre family so well known and respected in this neighbourhood. De ceased was a loyal Churchman and al ways took the keenest interest in the work of the Church. He is survived by ghter Mrs. Lombard of Searsport Maine.
