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### Jericho Falls To the British

London, Feb. 22-The British have costured Jericho, in Palestine, the war offic announces.

The city was entered by Australian troops yesterday. Little opposition was encountered. Subsequently the Aus tralians established themselves on the line of the Jordan and the Wadi Auja

The official statement reports the continuation of bad weather. North and northwest of Jerusalem, the Brit ish advanced positions were extended slightly and rendered secure.

During the fighting of Wednesday the casualties of the British troops were again slight.

(Since the capture of Jerusalem the British have been pushing ahead stead ily, striking out to the north and east. Official statements from London in the last few days have reported rapid pro grees, and apparently the Turks have offered no determined resistance

Aside from its bistorical importance, in connection with the British place to free the Holy Land from the domin ation of the Turks, the capture of Jericho is of little significance.

Its chief strategic value lies in the fact that it gives the British domination of the valley of Jordon and also comt-ol of a net-work of highways radiat ing from the town. A further advance eastward of 25 miles, however, would take the British to the railway from Damascus to Mecca, which would cut off the Turks' line of communication with Arabia, and greatly assist the revolting Arab tribes which are con cperating with the British.

Turkish forces acting in Pedjas and Son thern Arabia stready virtually are cut off from the outside world.
