Rules Governing Standing

Field Crops Competitions

SEASON 1918

Standing Field Crops Competitions will be held in the various counties of New Brunswick during the season of 1918 on the following basis:-

There will be four competitions in each county, viz:-

WHEAT, 1 acre; OATS, 2 acres; TURNIPS, 1 " POTATOES, 2 "

The variety must be named when making entry.

An entry fee of fifty cents will be charged for one crop and twenty-five cents for each additional crop entered by any one farm.

Entries will not be received for more than one variety of Wheat, Oats, Turnips or Potatoes from one farm.

Entries accompanied by the stipulated entry fees must be lodged with the Secretary of each Agricultural Society on or before July 20th.

The Secretary of each Agricultural Society will forward all entries and fees thus received to M. A. MacLeod, Supt. Agricultural Societies, Department of Agriculture, Fredericton, on or before July 25th.

Entries not lodged with the Department of Agriculture before August 1st and entries not accompanied by the specified entry fees will not be judged.

The minimum number of contestants necessary to constitute a competition in any one crop in a county will be five.

A prize will not be awarded on any crop that does not score 80 points out of a possible 100 points.

The number of prizes in each competition will be based on the number of competitors and the score they make as follows:-

Table showing prize amounts based on number of entries: 5 Entries Scoring 80 Points or Over \$ 15.00, 6 to 10 " " " " " " " " 30.00, etc.

The sum of five dollars will be deducted from each of the foregoing amounts and the balance will be divided pro rata among the contestants scoring 80 points or over.

To the highest awards will be added an additional sum of three dollars and two dollars respectively (these amounts constitute the five dollars deducted as above mentioned as a special inducement to aim for first place.

First and second prize winners will be required to exhibit their grain and roots at the Provincial Seed Fair, Fredericton, before the above mentioned additional amounts are paid.

The judging will be done by representatives of the Department of Agriculture.

Prize winners in the Standing Field Crops Competitions will find it to their advantage to select, clean and grade their surplus good grain and offer it for sale for seed purposes and buy their feed oats if necessary. The growing of good seed grain is a profitable side line for the progressive New Brunswick farmer.

Establish a reputation for good seed and square dealing.

Sell no grain for seed that you would not wish someone else to sell to you and all your seed grain surplus will readily sell at remunerative prices.

An entry in the field crops competitions will start you on the right track.

Notice to Owners of Dogs

A LAW

To provide for the taxing of dogs and the preventing of same from running at large.

1. Every person who is within the Town of Woodstock the owner, possessor or harbourer of a dog, shall pay a yearly tax of Three Dollars for each male dog and Six Dollars for each female dog.

2. Every person who is within the Town the owner, possessor or harbourer of a dog shall before the First Day of June, in each year hereafter procure such dog to be numbered, described and registered for the year commencing on the First Day of January then last, in the office of the Town Marshall and shall cause such dog to wear around his neck a collar of metal or of leather with metal plate on which metal collar or plate shall be inscribed the name of such person and to which collar shall be attached a metal check on which shall be inscribed the letters and figures indicating the year on which such tax has been paid and a number corresponding with the number under which such dog is for the time being registered in the books of the Town Marshall.

3. Every person shall on the payment of the tax imposed by Section 1 of this By-Law and registering his dog as provided in Section 2, be furnished free of charge with the metal check mentioned in the next preceding section.

4. The Town Marshall or any other person authorized for that purpose by the Town Council may seize any dog found roaming at large elsewhere than on the premises of the owner, possessor or harbourer thereof, contrary to the provisions of this By-law and it shall be the duty of such Town Marshall or any other person to do so and the Marshall or such other person after making such seizure shall retain such dog in some convenient place for forty-eight hours and in case the dog is not claimed by the owner, possessor or harbourer thereof within in said forty-eight hours, then it shall be the duty of said Marshall or such other person as aforesaid to kill the said dog.

5. The owner, possessor or harbourer of any dog so taken into custody as aforesaid under the next preceding section may reclaim his dog on application to the said Marshall or such other person on proof of his ownership, and on the payment of the sum of One Dollar which shall be retained by the Marshall or such other person so seizing and retaining such dog, and upon the payment of the tax imposed by Section 1 of this By-Law and the registering of such dog as provided by Section 2, of this By-Law provided that the tax upon the dog so taken into custody shall not have been already paid.

6. The owner, possessor or harbourer of any dog within the Town neglecting or refusing to pay the amounts specified in this By-Law to be paid on or before the First Day of June, in each and every year as aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than Three Dollars and not more than Ten Dollars for each and every dog or bitch so owned, kept or harboured.
