To collect, receive, invest and hold funds from voluntary contributions and subscriptions for the objects of the League.
To thoroughly organize an educational campaign throughout Canada in matters pertaining to the Navy and the Mercantile Marine.
To raise Funds for the relief of British and Canadian Sailors or their dependents, and for the Sailors' Homes, Institutes and Hospitals in Canada throughout the Empire.
To encourage and organize Volunteer Naval Brigades for boys and young men, in which they can receive practical and theoretical instruction in seamanship to prepare them for service in our Navy and Mercantile Marine, inland or fresh water.
The League may co-operate with any kindred Society designed to promote the welfare of the Sailors.
It shall be a fundamental principle of the League that its objects, Meetings, Management and Conduct shall be absolutely unconnected with and free from all party politics.
