William Lyon

On Saturday, July 13th, Mr. William Lyon, of Glassville, passed away at the home of his daughter Mrs. Robert Hovey of Greenfield N. B. He was in the eighty-eighth year of his age and had been in failing health for about six months.

Deceased was born in the parish of Aberdeen Banffshire Scotland on August 25th 1830. In 1860 he came to Canada with the pioneers of Glassville. He settled first in Woodstock N. B. where he worked as blacksmith for three years and then moved to Glassville where he resided ever since. For many years he was the "village blacksmith" of Glassville and at the same time cleared land and did extensive farming. He was married before leaving Scotland to Miss Jane Taylor of Aberdeen. By her he had twelve children, ten of whom survive, they are, five sons, Alexander and Albert, of Glassville; James and John of Caribou, Me., and Dawson, of South Africa; and five daughters, Mrs. Isabella Shannon, of Boston, Mass., Mrs. Robert Hovey, of Greenfield, N. B., Mrs. James Hovey, of Argyle, N. B.; Mrs. William Donaghy, of Gardiner, Me., and Mrs. Thomas Chapman, of Northwood Centre, N. H. He is also survived by a number of grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Mr. Lyon was a man of true christian character, an earnest bible student, and a faithful member of the church of christ. The funeral was held on Monday afternoon and was largely attended. The remains were conveyed to Glassville. Service was there held in the Presbyterian Church and was conducted by Rev. M. H. Manuel assisted by Rev. F. Le Grout. The body was then laid to rest beside that of his wife who died six years ago.
