## THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

The Prettiest Building—A Large Congregation—Able Addresser.

Few expected so many people would gather to attend the meetings in connection with the dedication services of the new Baptist church. Very early in the morning carriages began to arrive from all quarters. Long before the hour for opening came the church was crowded. For it had been rumored that able speakers would be there, and no one was disappointed. The ADVERTISER regrets that lack of space forbids the possibility of its giving an epitome of each sermon. The first meeting, at 10:30 a. m. was addressed by Rev. Mr. Hinson, of Moncton. He is very popular in his own city, and justly so. He is an earnest and gifted orator. His address was highly enjoyed. Rev. Mr. Baker, formerly of Woodstock, preached at the same hour in the Methodist church. Both houses were crowded to the doors.

At 2:30 Rev. Joseph Cahill preached and at five o'clock there was a social service led by Rev. Mr. Hinson. He preached again in the evening and his address was no less appreciated than in the morning. Special mention should be made of the music, which throughout was good. The anthem in the evening was very well rendered and Mrs. Curtis part was exceptionally well done. Miss Ella Campbell officiated as organist throughout the day.

Nearly \$200 was raised during the day, to assist in paying for the church. At the evening meeting nearly \$100 was subscribed.

The new building is said by many to be the finest in the county outside of Woodstock. The contractors were H. M. Stevens and Judson Currie. The desinging of the interior was the origination of Mr. Stevens. The woodwork, masonry, tenting and painting was all done by Stevens & Currie.

## PROHIBITION PLEBISITE CAMPAIGN.

Temperance People of Woodstock Actively Organizing for the Work.

A convention of temperance workers was held in Woodstock on Monday 12th inst., at which a thorough organization was effected for the work of the campaign. The vote is expected sometime in October, and it is felt that the work must be begun at once. Following are the executive officers for this county: Col. McLeod Vince, President; E. M. Boyer, Secretary; Mrs. J. D. Dickinson, Treasurer, with Vice Presidents for each parish as follows: W. B. Benn, W. O. Cluff, L. R. Harding, C. J. Connelly, J. K. Fleming, A. F. onson and Rev. W. H. Spargo Vice Presidents at large.

Committees on literature, public meetings and finance were also appointed.

Following is a communication from the chairman of the finance committee setting forth some of the work to be done.

Hartland, N. B., July 13th.

Dear Friend:

On Monday 12th inst. an organization was effected at Woodstock for Carleton County, for the purpose of conducting the plebiscite campaign in behalf of the prohibition of the liquor traffic in our Dominion.

The rum men are organizing and are raising a large sum of money with which to carry on their campaign.

There are the legitimate expenses of such a contest, such as hall rents, printing, travelling expenses of workers and speakers, etc. It has been decided to appeal to all those interested for subscriptions, also that a collection be taken in each church in behalf of the fund and that each temperance or other christian organization be asked to contribute as a society.

In this campaign there should be the dropping out of sight all party or sectarian lines and as a united Church of Jesus Christ a firm resolute battle waged against the accursed traffic.

Collectors under the direction of the parish vice presidents will see to the collection of individual subscriptions. Of you we ask that you look after the contributions from any church or society with which you may be connected.

All remittances should be made to Mrs. J. D. Dickinson, Woodstock, N. B.

The vote is expected early in the autumn therefore there is no time to lose.

## I. O. G. T.

The 28th annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, I. O. G. T., was held last week at Havelock. Committees were appointed and reports from standing committees were received. Rev. Mr. Marshall reported as delegate last year to the Supreme Grand Lodge, and gave a most interesting account of his trip through Switzerland. Mr. W. R. Gould, Grand Chief Templar, in his address expressed pleasure at meeting the representatives of the various lodges, told of the visits he had made during the year, referred to the state of the order, and expressed gratitude for the excellent condition the order is in. Grand Secretary Burns stated that the membership is: Active, 3,472; inactive, 583; total, 4,005. The receipts were \$667.95, and the expenditure \$649.14, leaving a balance of \$18.81. The total balance is \$76.20. At the beginning of the year there were 69 lodges on the roll. Thirteen lodges have been organized.
