Troops For Manila.

Five Thousand To Be Sent Across To The Philippines.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 9.—Within this week five thousands men will be quartered at the Presidio in this city, awaiting transportation to Manila. Every day troops from Oregon, Washington, Utah and Idaho will be pouring in and the work of mustering in the militia will continue. The state and federal authorities here are working night and day to have all in readiness when the transports lie alongside the wharves for their freight. Word came from Washington late last night that all branches of the service would be represented in the first shipment to the Philippines, and that California had earned the warm commendation of the Secretary of War for its admirable celerity in mustering in its quota, and for the character of the men that composed it. No effort is being spared to get into the ranks of the army and navy every company in California.

HONG KONG, May 10.—It is reported that naval movements are progressing which suggest an intention on the part of the powers to intervene between the United States and Spain.

LONDON, May 10.—The Daily Mail hears from Hong Kong that the Spaniards at Manila are still arrogant. They are unlikely to surrender until the city is blown to pieces.

MADRID, May 9.—An official despatch from Havana asserts that an American cruiser and a large torpedo boat attempted to force the Cardenas channel and opened fire on the Spanish gunboats Antonio Lopez, Ligeria and Olerta. After a half hour's engagement the American warships, the despatch says, were forced to retreat.

LONDON, May 10.—The chamber of commerce of some of the most important Spanish ports, says a special despatch from Madrid, have decided to provide and fit out several auxiliary cruisers of from 3,000 to 4,000 tons and having a speed of 18 to 20 knots, to watch the Spanish coast, venture out to sea and run a blockade if necessary.

LONDON, May 11.—There is no confirmation of the report that the Spanish fleet from the Cape Verde Islands has returned to Cadiz, but it is generally regarded as the most likely movement to be made, and as an indication that Spain has decided to let her West Indian possessions go. The question is generally asked, what possible use has Spain for continuing a hopeless struggle, as it is considered next to impossible that she has any alternative plan or that the retreat of the squadron hides some strategic design.

KEY WEST May 11 —

It is said here that if report that Spanish fleet has returned to Spain is correct an active movement against Cuba may occur within 48 hours. It is possible that Rear Admiral Sampson and Commodore Schley may strike simultaneously. Naval officers here believe the defences of any point except Havana could be reduced by the ships now here, and on the Cuban stations in half an hour.

LONDON May.11.—The Globe this afternoon publishes despatch from Cadiz saying following ships are ready for sea at that port Pelayo, Vittoria, Carlos III Almiranto, Quando, Vizayo Maria Teresa Critsobal, Colson, Alfonso XIII, Pluton, Prosperina, Osada, Andazi, Furor and Terror also several torpedo boats and transports. The squadron is expected to sail today.
