COUNTY COUNCILLORS!

County of Carleton.

The election of County Councillors will be held on

Tuesday, the Thirty-First day of October next.

Fifteen days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three of the most public places of the parish. Nomination of candidates at or before six o'clock p.m. on Monday the 23rd day of October. Parish Clerks to post names of candidates in three of the most public places in each polling district on or before Thursday, 26th October. Candidates' names also to be posted up at the polling place before the opening of the poll on day of election. The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as case may be) to act as chairman unless he refuses to do so, or is absent or not competent by reason of relationship to candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present. Assessors are required to furnish poll books with list of electors.

Note that time for holding election has been changed by Chapter 34 of Acts of 1898 formerly under Acts of 1877 Chapter 34, 1st Session Tuesday in October, but now in the last Tuesday in October.

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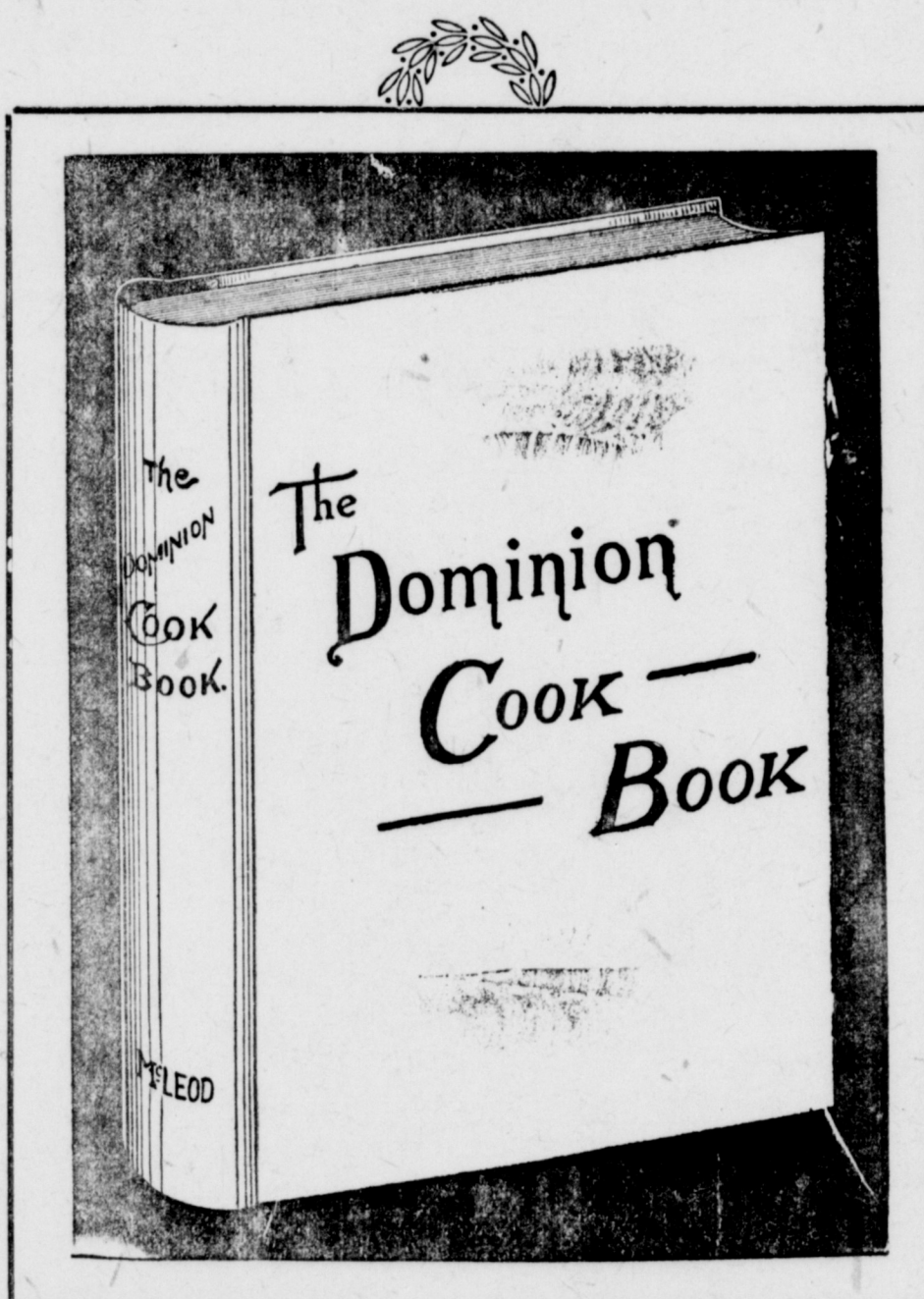
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
