Home Industries.

EDGECOMBE AND SON'S CARRIAGE FACTORY. Our reporter called at the carriage manufactory of Messrs. Edgcombe & Sons, yesterday, and had the pleasure of inspecting the extensive premises of the firm, and learning something of their large and ever increasing business.

The firm is composed of John Edgcombe, Esq., and his two sons, W. G. and A. G. Edgcombe, and each has his particular department, over which he exercises supervision. Mr. Edgcombe, senior, who is a native of Devonshire, England, came to this country in 1831, and worked at his trade that of a carriage maker for eight years, first in Andover, and then in Boston, until 1839, when he removed to this city and started business for himself.

He shortly afterwards erected a factory on York street, which like the one following was destroyed by fire. The present commodious structure was erected in 1867 and is admirably fitted for its intended purpose. Its dimensions are 80 feet front by 100 feet in depth. It is four stories in height and is constructed of brick. In the basement are situated the boiler, engine, spoke and turning lathes, circular saw, one forge, a planer of modern style and various other machinery.

The Messrs. Edgcombe make a specialty of carriages, particularly the "Piano Box," "Ever General Grant," "Jenny Lind," and Portland fancy styles, doubles and open covered, single and double, and top buggies. Their sleighs, also, are of the most modern patterns, and those which are now in course of construction for this season's trade. The principal business of the firm is in the Maritime Provinces although a number of carriages have been sent to the Upper Provinces and some even to the old country.

The occupants of Government House have been his patrons ever since Mr. Edgcombe started business, and during the time the City was garrisoned he did all the work of the Officers. The stock of which the carriages and sleighs are constructed is of hickory, oak, and ash, and is selected by one of the firm every year in the United States. The wheels are imported from Dayton, Ohio, Newark, New Jersey, and Amesbury, Mass. The springs and axles are also imported from the United States.

The firm has facilities for turning out 200 carriages every season, and as many sleighs. The sales of carriages this season amounted to 90. The Messrs. Edgcombe use the best of tools, and some of the firm exercises personal supervision over every department of the work, so that the work they turn out is of the best description, thus giving them the reputation of building the finest carriages in the Province. This is proved by the fact that in a sharp competition at the Provincial Exhibition of 1875, they took 1st and 2nd prizes for carriages, and also a 1st prize for sleighs.

Mr. A. G. Edgcombe has charge of the business department; Mr. W. G. Edgcombe a general supervision over the mechanical work, and Mr. Edgcombe, senior, attends to the getting out of the stock. About 25 workmen are employed throughout the year, many of whom have been in the service of the firm for very lengthened terms. Henry Shaw, formerly foreman of the mechanical department, has been 28 years in the service of the firm. John Edgcombe, John Edmunds, foreman of the blacksmith shop, 26 years; John Harvey, trimmer, 25 years, and many others 12 and 14 years. The fine carriage department is in charge of Mr. Aaron Kearney, an excellent mechanic and a respectable young man.

A gentleman from Upper Queensbury came into our office last week and furnished the following items:

The wheat crop of that section yielded an increase of one fourth above the average. Oats are an excellent crop. Corn was a total failure on account of the frost. Buckwheat has turned out well and potatoes are very free from rot, which is exceptional. Messrs. Gunter and Ingraham are feeding a large quantity of cattle for exportation, and "Mr. Parent's piggy is in full blast," the latter being quite a local institution.

Shaffer Temple returned from Bathurst yesterday. Before leaving he made arrangements for carrying on extensive lumbering operations upon the Tete-a-gouche, Middle River and Mill Stream; about half the work having been contracted for, the balance will be got out by his own force. The rates at which the Sheriff made his contracts for delivery at the mill boom, are about one-third less than those current in this locality.

We understand that Mr. F. P. Thompson is forming a Joint Stock Company for the purpose of engaging in the manufacture of agricultural implements on a large scale. There is abundance of room and a good field for such an organization, and we would like to see it established at Fredericton. Under competent management, it should be a profitable business, returning good dividends to all the stockholders.
