A Successful Potato Digger.

On Tuesday, September 16th, by arrangement with the inventor and manufacturer, we were present at a test of a new Potato Digger on the farm of Messrs. Dawson & LePage near Charlottetown.

Hitched to a pole, the horses pulled the Digger along walking upon each side and close to the row; the share lifted the soil and the mould board swept it between the row and the one adjoining it to the right, in the operation covering the tops and leaving most of the potatoes in sight.
