Special Meeting of the City Council. RETIREMENT.

A Special Meeting of the City Council was held on Tuesday evening, His Worship the Mayor presiding. The full Board of Aldermen was present.

Ald. Burhill moved for a committee to negotiate a loan to meet current school expenses. Carried.

On motion of Ald. Moore, the Mayor was appointed such committee.

Also moved, a committee to negotiate a loan to meet coupons on Debentures due March 1st. The latter was carried.

Ald. Wheeler moved that the expenditure for the Administration of Justice for the year be limited to \$1000.

Ald. Wheeler moved in amendment that it be limited to \$400.

Ald. Wheeler discussed the great cost incurred by the city in the Administration of Justice, and thought there was room for economy in that connection.

Ald. McPherson followed advocating an extreme course.

On the suggestion of Ald. Burhill, the matter was dropped till the report of the Police Committee should be presented, which appears hereafter.

Ald. Clinton moved that the Clerk of the Phoenix Square Market be instructed to collect tolls as per By-law.

Ald. McPherson moved that a By-law be prepared to annul the By-law, authorizing the collection of tolls in Phoenix Square Market.

The amendment was put and lost by the casting vote of the Mayor.

The original resolution was then put and carried.

Ald. McPherson moved that execution be issued against Dominion Officials for the collection of their taxes.

Ald. Wheeler moved in amendment that the matter stand over till the next regular meeting of the Council. Carried by a vote of 7 to 3.

Ald. Burhill, Chairman of the Police Committee, submitted a report, the gist of which was that the committee had a meeting with the Police Magistrate about the disposal of the police force, and that he expressed a willingness to co-operate with the Council in their efforts to economize, but as he was responsible for the peace and safety of the city he thought three policemen were necessary, and the power of appointment and dismissal rested with him.

Ald. Wilson moved, seconded by Ald. McPherson, the report be received and filed.

Ald. Gunter moved in amendment that no money be appropriated for the support of police force for March. A lively discussion followed. Ald. Gunter, McPherson, and Clinton strongly supporting the amendment.

Ald. Gunter in the end, resigned the position taken by the Police Magistrate with respect to the appointment of policemen.

Ald. Wilson read the legal opinion on the question which fully upheld the Police Magistrate's position.

On motion of Ald. McPherson, the following committee was appointed: Ald. McPherson, Wilson, Smith, Moore, Wheeler.

The pay of laborers in the employ of the city was fixed at \$1.00 per day from March 1st till September 1st.

The meeting then adjourned.

The richest young heiress of the day in England is Miss Maynard, grand-daughter of Viscount Maynard. She has £200,000 a year in land, and large accumulations of money.

The last year showed a great increase in the number of emigrants sailing from Liverpool. The returns for the year show that 117,914 persons left England. Of these 61,801 were English and 13,904 Irish, the rest being chiefly foreigners.

There was a total increase of 46,792 as compared with the previous year.

The practice of snow-eating is a fruitful cause of catarrh. The great tunnel under the British Channel, with which it is proposed to connect England and France, has not been really begun, the only step taken being the sinking of a shaft near Sangatte, in order to ascertain the depth and currents of the water. This shaft has a diameter of about nine feet, and is to go to the depth of 200 feet.

So rapidly does the water come in, however, that a machine capable of extracting 900 gallons per minute has been found necessary. The walls of the shaft are lined with small oak planks, with a backing of concrete. The earth which has been excavated is of a white, chalky nature, and very hard.
