## Maritime Farmer.

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 13, 1880. Prorogation of Parliament.

The Dominion Parliament was prorogued last Friday afternoon, after a session three months' duration. An immensity of work might have been gone through within that time, but, though there was much speaking, not a great deal of important legislation was done. There was a debate on the tariff, which lasted three weeks, and gave the members the opportunity they desired of making a set speech, but which did not result in anything, did not increase or decrease the government majority, and did not beyond doubt, make clear the position of the country under its working. The tariff is neither the grand success or the complete failure which its friends and foes proclaim it to be. It is still doubtful whether the rovernment will be able to raise sufficient revenue under it to meet their increasing expenditures, and avoid making deficits-but,

Sir Leonard Tillev is very hopeful. The great debate on the Pacific Railwaywhich was opened by Sir Charles Tupper, in a very sble and exhaustive speech, and in which Mr. Blake, the new leader of the opposition distinguished himself, made clear that the government do not trust to Imperial aid to help them to build the raad, but are determined to prosecute vigorously the work at both ends, west to the "Rocky Mountains," and in British Cojumbia, and sangumely hope that the proceeds of the sale of the lands will supply a fund sufficient for the purpose without entailing encreased taxation on the Dominion. Death of Hon. Geerge Brown.

At two o'clock on Sunday morning the Hon. George Brown, died-forty days-from the time he received the fatal wound in his struggle to disarm Bennett, the discharged Globe employee-days of pain, and the struggle of a powerful constitution to resist the lethal assault of collapse and utter unconsciousness. Bismarck and Hamburg,

A difficulty has arisen between Prince Bismarck and the representatives of Hamburg which proceeds from the fact that the political boundaries of Germany do not coincide with the Customs frontier. The free city of Hamburg has one vote in the Federal Council and three representatives in the Reichstag, but levies its own Customs duties, and in commercial matters treats the territory embraced in the Zollverein as that of a foreign State. For this privilege the city pays to the general exchequer a larger sum (\$500,000) in proportion to its population han is paid by the members of the Customs Union. 
