The wide, weight, about 750 lbs. crops will give more than an average made it very necessary that it should be secured, and the present favorable time is seized upon in right good earnest. Hundreds of tons, and we might with safety say thousands, of a fair quality of cattle food will be secured by the end of the present week. Another important source of supply will be in the splendid growth of oatstraw, which in the first of the haying season looked so unpromising. The yield will be as gratifying as it was unexpected, and when harvested in good order, without bleaching in the field, and cut a little in the green order, makes a fair fodder. Cattle fed upon good oat straw with a little winter quite as well as when fed on the average quality of hay. We advise a careful husbanding of all description of cattle food, Nothing should be allowed to go to waste; the corn-stalks, which in too many cases are a'lowed to remain in the field to the disadvantage and annovance of next spring's operations, should be carefully cut and housed, as they are valuable as a fodder plant.

Profit of Sheep Raising.

Four years ago, Mr. Fleet bought ten head of sheep, says the Mankato Review, for which he paid \$4 each, or \$40 for the lot. The first year the wool crop sold for \$18; the second. \$38; and the third, \$86; or a total of \$142. He has killed six head, which have netted him more than the original outlay, and still has fifty head of old sheep, and thirty young ones. from which he estimates that he will shear at least \$160 worth of wool. This will give \$300 for wool in the four years, and his flock is worth \$250 more. Of course their keeping has been a source of expense, but the benefit of a flock of sheep in keeping down weeds and brush on a farm almost compensate for their care. A farmer of experience in wool growing has well said that there is more money in growing wool at twenty cents a pound than to loan your money at ten per cent. interest.
