Not a summer passes that we do not hear of hail storms of "unprecedented severity in many parts of our broad land. This summer is no exception to the rule. Perhaps the most remarkable fall of hail, thus far reported, occurred in Warren County, Mo., July 1. The extent of the storm was about 20 miles by less than 1 mile in width, the heaviest fall of hail covering about 2 square of various shapes, and ranged in size from JUST that of a hazelnut up to blocks of ice 104 inches long, 5 inches wide, and 1 inch thick. The hail fell to a depth of 5 or 6 inches on a level, and in places where it was drifted against houses or fences it reached a depth of a foot or more. The damage done was very great, the ice smashing not only windows, but sashes and blinds; and the roofs of all the houses in the path of the storm were so injured that new roofs had to be put besides many hogs. The horses, mules, and cattle exposed to the storm were badly bruised; some had their eyes knocked out, and others were so seriously battered as trees were greatly injured, the bark being


