DONATION TO REV. MR. McLEOD.—The Free Baptists and their friends had a pleasant gathering in the basement of their Church on New Year's night, when the Pastor, Rev. Jos. McLeod, was presented with a complimentary address accompanied by the handsome sum of \$104, which we understand has since been increased by kind friends to an amount considerably over that. During the evening the young people of the congregation gave selections of music, and humorous addresses were given by Revs. Messrs. Beckwith, Evans, Stevens, Dr. Rand, and Inspector Gaunce.

The entertainment was in every way a social one, and the magnificent gift to Mr. McLeod was truly indicative of the strong love the Free Baptists have for their popular pastor. J. A. Vanwart, Esq., ably presided.

FIRE.—A shed adjoining the Officers' Barracks was burned New Year's night. The fire is supposed to have originated from boys smoking on the premises. A barn belonging to Mr. Robert Mitchell, on St. John Street, but at present in possession of C. H. B. Fisher, was burned on the same night, and with it a cow and a few tons of hay. It was insured in the North British and Mercantile Insurance Company, of which Mr. J. L. Inches is agent, for \$100.

It was the most distressing fire that has occurred here for a long time, and that which consumed the house of Mrs. Mary Ann Martin, Tuesday morning at an early hour. It appears to have been caused by a candle, stovepipe, and so quickly wrapped the entire building in flames, that it was with the greatest difficulty and without scarcely a particle of clothing that the inmates escaped from their burning home. Very little of the furniture was saved, and there was no insurance on either all their clothing, and the family lost nearly all their house and the savings of a lifetime.

We know of no case that has awakened a more genuine sympathy in the breasts of our citizens than the case of Mrs. Martin and her family, and we are glad to learn that a number of gentlemen have set themselves to work to afford relief to the sufferers, by collecting a sum of money, and it is indeed creditable to the hands and hearts of our people that the amount has already reached a very respectable size.

Further than this the musical friends of Miss Martin are planning a concert to be given for her benefit, in the City Hall shortly. None are more desiring of this than Miss Martin. She has been forward in lending her assistance to nearly every Musical Entertainment of note, that has been given here for several years, and a complimentary benefit would only be a grateful acknowledgment for her services so often rendered. We trust the idea will be most successfully carried out, in fact there is not a doubt but that it can be, if a few will lend aid. This will give our citizens who have not felt themselves able to contribute to the gentlemen who have been soliciting subscriptions for the family, an opportunity to set themselves to work in another way, and thus deserving young lady.

We are pleased to see that St. Dunstan's Society have concluded to give the proceeds of their Concert on Monday evening, to the same worthy object.

REUNIONS.—Dr. Brown's horse took fright and ran away on Monday, breaking the new sleigh, worth \$140, to splinters. The Doctor's horse was started by some children pelting it with snow. Although spirited the horse could always be depended upon, and stood quiet in the street while Dr. Brown visited patients, but this occurrence will not admit of his placing the same dependence in it, in future.

A horse driven by a young man in Mr. A. Sterling's employ, made matters lively on Queen and Carleton Streets, Tuesday afternoon. The horse and sled to which he was attached, both escaped without injury how.

We have also heard that the sleighs of Mr. Logan of the N. B. Railway and Mr. Fred. Thompson collided, with considerable damage to the latter, while racing "down the lane."

City Council Meeting.

The final meeting of the City Council, as at present constituted, was held Tuesday night, at which His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen Babbitt, Richey, Burchill, Moore, Gunter, G. H. Simmons, I. W. Simmons and Vanline were present. The following business was transacted:—

The Council's report was read and adopted, and the following accounts passed—Roads and Streets, \$30.92; Fire Department, \$13.90; Contingent, \$90.02; Administration of Justice, \$69.92. \$200 was voted to Alms House Committee for use of the poor.

The petitions of Wm. Sewell, John Brown, Edward Seery, and A. C. Hall, were referred to the Assessment Appeal Committee. The petition of W. H. Taylor was not complied with. The petition of O. S. Morgan, praying for cancellation of lease given by City Clerk to him, and the refund of rent, referred to Alderman of Wellington Ward.

City Clerk reported that all arrears of ground rent had been paid, except that of Atherton and Morgan.

The City Clerk also reported the decision of the Chief Justice in the market matter, which will be read elsewhere.

Alderman Burchill then moved the following resolution which was seconded by Ald. Moore:—

Resolved, that it be deemed a breach of duty on the part of the Mayor, to be governed by instructions received from any other Alderman, in moving the resolution, in which he strongly condemned the action of the six Aldermen, who had taken upon themselves the making of the Upper Market a free one. Ald. Geo. H. Simmons and Gunter were warmly applauded, and for some time things were quite lively in the august body. Ald. Burchill closed the debate, and on the question being taken the resolution was carried by the casting vote of His Worship the Mayor.

Yeas—Burchill, Moore, Richey, Babbitt, the Mayor—5. Nays—I. W. Simmons, G. H. Simmons, Vandine, Gunter—4.

For some reason the Alderman of Carleton Ward were not present at the light ward, he had been keener, as Ald. Beck would have undoubtedly given the losing party the benefit of his oratory, and Ald. Smith would have had his say too. These two gentlemen require to be heard from in defence of their absence on so important an occasion, as well as their action in the premises.

As the matter stands must give credit to our down town friends of having got the better of our near neighbors. The resolution was a pretty strong vote of want of confidence as well as a severe reprimand. It was good sport, however, at the meeting of the Council Chamber, where there has been greater display of oratory and stronger outbursts of feeling. Ald. Gunter is said to have excelled himself, and that is saying a good deal.

After the question had been taken His Worship said, in defence of his vote, that he had pursued a course such as that taken by the six Aldermen with regard to the Market question, he would consider it a breach of the duty of his office. That coming down on the unfortunate six rather severely too.

Checks were ordered to issue to Ald. Gunter for \$50 to pay Revisors, and \$50 to Martin Nowlan for services as fireman to the City Hall for the session.

The policeman and city teamster were ordered to be paid their past month's salaries. The Market Committee through G. H. Simmons submitted their report, which briefly is as follows:—

(1) Pending the decision of the market case, the committee recommend it advisable to instruct the Market Clerk to declare the upper market free and ask their action be continued.

(2) The Committee recommend that the question otherwise remain in statu quo till new Council meets.

(3) It is the opinion of the Committee that the matter should be followed up, and city rights in the markets be defined either in the Courts or Legislature.

Mr. Simmons moved the adoption of the Report in bloc.

Ald. Burchill moved an amendment that it be taken up section by section. Carried by the casting vote of the Mayor.

The second and third sections of the report were carried without division.

The Mayor reported that he had been served with a rule nisi to quash return to the mandamus in re John Owens, returnable in the February term of the Supreme Court. He stated it would be advisable for the Council to take action on this matter.

Moved by Ald. G. H. Simmons and seconded by Ald. Vandine, that the City Clerk be instructed to appear and show cause. This resolution was defeated by the following vote:—

Yeas—Ald. Gunter, G. H. Simmons, Vandine—3. Nays—Ald. Babbitt, Richey, Moore, I. W. Simmons, Burchill—5.

The effect of this vote will probably be, unless in the meantime it is rescinded, that a mandamus absolute will issue compelling the Council to grant a wholesale license to Mr. Owens.

A communication was read from the St. John Relief and Aid Society, enquiring the City's intention regarding the donation made to the sufferers by the late fire. The matter was laid over for the present.

A communication from H. B. Rainsford, jun., Secy-Treasurer of the Municipality of York, was read, asking for payment of Administration of Justice account.

Ald. I. W. Simmons reported as follows: The Committee on the subject of industrial enterprises recommend that the city do hereafter exempt from taxes, for ten years, from the time of opening, any company starting an industry, and already registered, here providing at least \$10,000 capital be paid up.

Report received and adopted. The insurance on the City's interests on the Exhibition Palace, was ordered to be renewed.

The following persons were selected to hold the ensuing civic elections:— For Mayor—W. H. Friel or Wilmut Guio, at the City Hall.

For Aldermen—Halifax Ward—Henry Hollock or Geo. H. Parker, at No. 4 Engine Room. St. Ann's Ward—T. B. Smith or W. H. Friel, at the City Hall.

Carleton Ward—A. P. Miller or Joseph Colter, at the Masonic Hall. Queen's Ward—Wm. Lockhart or John Cassels, at the Queen's House.

King's Ward—D. B. Baker or G. F. Whittaker, at No. 3 Engine Room. Alderman Simmons reported verbally for the Market Committee, that they had given Mr. A. Limerick the sole right to advertise in the County Market until the 1st of May next, for \$27.50.

Council then adjourned sine die.

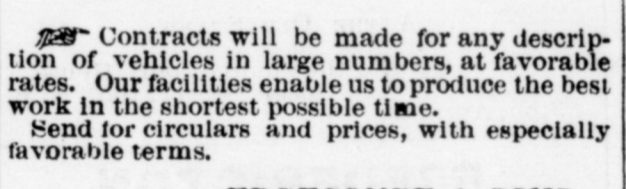
