Vannor's Predictions.

The following are Vannor's weather predictions for the remainder of July and the month of August:—

July 20th—Cool and showery. 30th and 31st—Warm high winds and rain showers.

August 1st—Probably warm and oppressive. 2nd and 5th—Generally pleasant weather, fairly warm days, and cool to cold evenings and nights.

6th—Fair and pleasant. 7th (Sunday)—Heat and storms. 8th and 10th—Sultry weather with heavy showers; cooler evenings and nights.

11th 13th—Heat again in the United States, with cloudy and sultry weather; storms in Canada. 14th (Sunday)—Cooler change. 15th—Cooler to cool and cloudy and pleasant.

16th—Storms throughout portions of Virginia. 17th and 18th—Hailstorms and frost probably in some portions.

19th and 20th—Heat and storms. 21st—Sultry and showery. 22nd—Sultry and windy. 23rd and 24th—Heat and wind.

25th and 26th—Heavy storms on the lakes. 27th and 28th—Cool weather, with rain and frosts in the northern section. 30th and 31st—Fair and pleasant weather, with cool evenings and nights, with indications of returning heat.

The successor of Sir John Glover, as Governor of Newfoundland, is announced to be Lieut. Col. Sir H. F. B. Massé, K. G. M. G., who has been since 1853, Governor of the Island of Heligoland, at the mouth of the Elbe. He was Aide-de-Camp to Lord Cardigan during the Crimean war, and distinguished himself in the campaign so that he obtained the appointment of Governor of Heligoland in 1853, with a salary of 4800 per annum. This position he has held ever since. It will be a considerable honor for the new Governor, from a limited command of three miles in circumference, for Heligoland is no more, to a territory of 43,000 miles in area, to say nothing of Labrador. In fact, the island part of Heligoland is a level plain 4,200 paces in circumference which is reached by ascending a cliff 200 feet in height. The low land is joined to this by an isthmus 500 paces in length, and is almost uninhabited, but has two good harbours.
