THURSDAY NIGHT'S MEETING. A meeting of the City Council was held Thursday night, at which Mayor Fisher presided and all the Aldermen were present except Ald. Hall who is absent from the city. Purdy asking for a change in the assessment of the property in consequence of his cellar on Brunswick street being flooded by water from the sewer. The petition was referred to Road Commissioners. Ald. Leigh presented a petition from 34 of the ratepayers of Kings and Queens wards asking for repairs to the drain at the back of the city. Referred to Road Commissioners. A petition was read from the St. Ann's Rowing Club asking for a lease of a small portion of wharf front at a nominal rent. Referred to Wharf Commissioners. Ald. Simmons presented the petition of David Colwell asking relief from taxes. The petition was complied with so far as remitting his taxes for 1879 and 1880. A petition was read from Benjamin Stickney and James Daley asking for privilege to take sand from near Parker's bridge at ten cents a load. Referred to Road Commissioners. Ald. Burchill reported, from the committee appointed to revise the miscellaneous license by-law, making certain changes in the scale of fees. Considerable discussion followed on the item for selling ale and wines as several of the Aldermen deemed it unnecessary under the existing law. The by-law on motion of Ald. Wheeler was received and read. Ald. Wilson presented the report of the assessment appeal committee recommending that the petition of Michael Slaven and Bertin Fong be complied with and that number of others be not granted. Ald. McPherson moved that a cheque for \$500 be issued in favor of the Alms House Commissioner. Carried. Ald. Wilson reported that the Fire Committee thought it undesirable to lease the city building on King street. The report was received and read. Ald. McPherson said the special committee met Mr. Randolph concerning the Dowling wharf and did not agree. Ald. Burchill moved that the city clerk be instructed to ask for better drainage on the assignees of the Dowling wharf property. Ald. Moore moved in amendment that the matter be referred to arbitration, which was carried. Mr. Arthur Limerick was selected as city arbitrator and the remuneration for his services fixed at \$5. Ald. Wheeler moved that a committee be appointed to negotiate the sale of debentures under the act passed at the last session of the Legislature. The following committee was appointed:—The Mayor, Ald. Wheeler, Simmons and Wilson. Ald. Simmons moved that \$500 be appropriated from ordinary revenues to make up the expenditure for schools. Carried. The Council adjourned until the following evening.
