A Bismarck Scandal.

It has been noted that "the man of blood and iron" has been very much out of humor and irritable lately. That is not extraordinary, for during the last ten years, ever since the close of the Franco-Prussian war, and the beginning of the contest with the Vatican, he has been more or less out of sorts. What with the Jesuits, Ultramontanes, the Liberals, Freethinkers, Socialists and Jews, he has not had an easy time. But his recent irritability and ill humor, has not been caused by an obstruction to his internal or external policy, by any party or parties in the state, but arises from a private grief. The great Chancellor finds it difficult (if not more so) to govern his own family as the Empire. His own son has caused him more grief and anger, than all the intrigues of the ultramontanes, or the threats of the Socialists. The scandal was notorious in Germany, before it got into the press:—

"A Berlin despatch confirms the story of the elopement of Count Herbert Bismarck with the Princess Elizabeth of Carlsburg-Benckendorf. Both arrived at Sleeswijk several weeks ago. The Princess is the wife of Prince Charles of Carlsburg-Beuthen, Count of Schouaritz, and chief of one of the first Prussian families. Her father is an hereditary member of the Upper House. The faithless wife is a step sister of Prince Hermann of the Hatfeld-Trachenberg, head of the Carlsburg family, that title since 1871, and daughter of the Countess of Beichenbach. She married Count Carl (1858), and has one daughter, the Princess Sybilla, aged fourteen. Prince Carl is 36 years of age, and has left Prussia, and retired to his estates in Silesia. He will commence a divorce suit. Count Bismarck, aged 62, was formerly Secretary of the German Legation at Berlin, and recently Secretary to his father, who deputed him as his chief assistant and eventual successor."
