A Huricane in Oregon.

The following harrowing account is given drawbacks; everything is on a great scale, pared to the blasts that howl over the Oregon, plains tearing houses from their foundations, pain and terror in human beings :--

The storm struck the east side of Gervais The storm struck the east side of Gervais at about three o'clock in the afternoon, sweeping everything before it. It came in a southeasterly direction, and was about 200 yards in width. It was first seen about a mile from town, where it struck one farm, demolishing outhouses in a fearful manner, picking up the dwelling-house, setting it twenty feet from its foundation, and pitching the inmates out into the storm. Some of them were badly bruised, but none seriously injured. The storm swept through the fields at a terrific rate, picking up sheep and fences like birds, and hurling them into the air twenty or thirty feet. A number of sheep were killed. their wants and effect exchanges. The more especially among his friends and pickets fired upon them, and our presence As it neared town it narrowed down to about fifty yards in width, and came in zigzag current, taking everything before it, striking the school-house on one corner. The children ran out to save their lives, and the scene that followed was terrible. They were lifted into the air from 20 to 80 feet, among lying the air from 20 to 80 feet, among lying timbers, sidewalk planks, and debris from barns and fences, and all fell to the ground senseless. Some had their arms broken. some their heads fractured, and all more or less bruised, but fortunately none were killed. Another house was taken two feet from its foundation and shattered almost to pieces. It so happened that the family were out visiting or they would have been killed, as a number of neighbouring outhouses and barns were thrown up against it. The windows and doors of a third house were also broken in, and the house more or less damaged. From here the cyclone rose into the air in the shape of a black cloud, and was seen to fall again about three miles distant. It was reported that it struck near the narrow guage railway, tearing it all to pieces. It was very fortunate that it changed its course as it entered the town, as it would have swept the whole


