Stock Farm. At the last meeting of the Board of Agri culture, a committee was appointed to examine several properties that were approved of for a Provincial Stock Farm. The committee returned to Fredericton on Monday last having visited the counties of St. John, King's, Albert, Sunbury, York and Carleton, for the purpose for which they were appointed. As the Board meets shortly, the committee will soon be able to submit their re-

We cannot, at present, state the conclusion at the committee have arrived at, as to the articular farms they will recommend, or whether they will confine their recommendation to one farm, but we learn that they were well pleased with several properties that can be obtained on favorable terms. When their report is made to the Board, and the recommendation of the Board is submitted to the Government, there will be no difficulty in selecting a suitable farm. We are very much gratified at the result of the labors of the farm will be obtained. That being the case it would be ill done to make difficulty by proposing any particular County. We think of course that the nearer the seat of government is to the farm, the better for its future working, and its more immediate inspection by the government and Legislature. But the great point is to get a farm and a

good one; this being obtained, its situation need not troubles us. The question of the farm being so far de termined, definite instructions were sent to England, by cable, to purchase the stock, a large portion of which will be placed on the farm, and the balance sold as soon after its arrival here as possible.

It is probable that the stock will be shipped early in August, and reach St. John or Halifax, by the middle of that month. The order includes Short Horn, Avrshire, Polled Angus, Red Norfolk and Hereford cattle, Shropshire, Oxfordshire Devon, Leicester and Cotswold sheep, and Berkshire and Yorkshire swine. This selection will give a very good variety, and leave quite a number of each kind for sale after the wants of the farm are supplied.
