Cattle at Pasture.

Cattle must not be left out too long after the feed becomes short, without extra feed at the barn. It never pays to starve an animal if food can be bought, or the animal sold to some one who has food. We have dwelt upon this so often, that it seems almost like useless repetition to allude to it again, and yet we can not drive three miles in any direction across the country, without finding cattle that are growing poor for want of better keeping. This is especially true of cows in milk. Farmers have yet something to learn before they will all have fat cattle, and plenty of fodder on hand at all seasons, but evident progress is being made.
