People who imagine that Great Britain on the decline, commercially, that she is not still the monarch of commerce, and the 'Mistress of the Seas," must, if their reasen is capable of being satisfied by arguments from facts and figures, when they read Mr Gladstone's speech at Leeds, be shaken out of their delusion. In the state of the country there are causes for anxiety; the prospects of its agriculture are black enough, and questions are looming up that seem to threaten to break up its social fabric, but she is incontestably the wealthiest nation in the world and there is little sign that she will be brought down from her position of financial, commercial and naval supremacy. The commerce of Great Britain with its 35 millions of people, even in a black year like 1879, was £612,000,000 stg. greater than the combined commerce of Germany and Russia, with their, together, ninety millions of population, and as great as the combined commerce of France, Russia, and Holland, with their populations of 121 millions. Great Britain possesses 52 per cent of the entire sea trade carried on by the entire human race, civilized and uncivilized. And she has about 1,300 millions of money, the surplus of her wealth, invested in foreign countries, which comes

back to her every year, mainly in the shape of imports, the income from which cannot possibly be less than sixty millions a year. Great Britain, certainly, occupies a very proud position, which is calculated to call forth, if not the admiration, at any rate, the envy of all the great countries in the world, a position from which she cannot be dislodged, save by dire internal commotions and convulsions, and by tremendous external and combined assaults, from which Heaven defend her. A gravel walk will last for many years without entailing additional expenditure beyond the original cost. All that is required to make a good gravel walk, is to see that it is properly graded, that suitable kerb stones are set down, and that material that will pack well is used to make the surface. And all this can be done at a very small cost. Aspalt might be used along the principal business blocks, (though not absolutely neces-
