The Michigan Fires.

The forest fires in the State of Michigan were very much more destructive to the life heralded by a copper-colored appearance in the sky, which changed to a deep red, and on Monday afternoon, 8th inst, by an intense darkness. A number of villages were completely burned down by the remorseless hurricane of flame,-Bad Axe, Verne, Forest of York, in holiday attire, with not a trace Bay, Richmond Ville, Anderson, Charleston, of anxiety for the shortness of the hay or potatoe crops on their faces, but all agog to Deckville, Harrisville, Sandusky.
