Experiments in Cattle Feeding. Professor Brown, of the Ontario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm, in his advance report, 1882, excess says that he is still prosecuting the inquiry as to what kinds of grain give most rapid and cheapest results in the fattening of cattle under three years old. It is only by the multiolication of experiments that reliable information can be gathered for the guidance of the average farmer.
