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KINGS COUNTY ELECTION.

Prof. Foster re-elected by a rousing Majority.

Yesterday the election to fill the vacancy in the representation of King's County, in the House of Commons, caused by the unseating of Prof. Foster, resulted in the reelection of that gentleman by a largely increased majority over his old opponent, Mr. James Deville.

Liberal-Conservative Catholic Protest.

The now notorious, if not historic, controversy in Ontario, over "Marmion," is not yet closed. It was commenced by Archbishop Lynch, who called the attention of the Mowatt Government to the fact that Catholic children in the Grammar Schools were required to use a book, which, in his opinion, contained matter offensive to them, and to the pastors of their church.
