The people's representatives were not particularly awe-stricken by the information. They only came to the conclusion that a good family can be no disgrace to a man, while, on the other hand, a man may be a disgrace to a good family.—Toronto Mail.

One day last week the Sheriff of Carleton County assisted by twelve constables of Carleton County, succeeded in capturing two men who have been long a terror to their neighbors. One of the two captured has nine different names, and was very lately at a party in Lower Greenfield, these men suddenly put out the lights by upsetting the tables, and injured a constable so severely that the doctor had to take several stitches in his nose. They all then left the house with out injury, although bullets flew thick around them. One bullet went through one of the men's hands.

A few days ago two men named Jones, father and son, were driving a wagon filled with powder, in the railway works near Jackass mountain, British Columbia, when the powder exploded, blowing the six horses and the wagon to pieces. The father was killed, the son was severely injured, and the wagon met a settler, who saw two blackened, bleeding, naked figures coming towards him. He assisted them to a settlement and summoned a doctor. The father died soon after, and the son is dying.
