JUSTICE VINDICATED.

The Lees Trial and Conviction.

A Popular Verdict.

The end of the Lees' case in the County Court was reached yesterday, at least so far as the most serious charge against them is concerned, that of murdering Sergt. Vandine while with other officers he was attempting their arrest on the 31st July last.

The trial which commenced on Thursday evening created great interest and during its progress attracted a large number of spectators to the Court Room. There was much difficulty in selecting a jury suitable to the nature of the prosecution and defence, and after two forenoons spent in challenging, during which two panels of twenty-one jurors each, were exhausted, the following were chosen—John Staples, Stephen Tripp, James Jones, Arthur G. Smith, John Mack, George A. Cliff, John E. Perks, Thos. Peppers, John Palmer, Anthony Currie, Mack Neville and Moses Smith.

Mr. Riddell will be brought in as soon as the law permits. The date has not yet been fixed, but in the meantime both Prof. Foster and Mr. Donville are in the field canvassing vigorously. The Globe and Transcript are urging the Liberals of King to bring out a candidate, but in view of the circumstances it is quite improbable that such a contest will be taken.

That Prof. Foster's majority will reach the hundreds.
