Emigration From Canada.

If the figures given by the Bureau of statistics, Washington, of the emigration from Canada to the United States, were correct, the Dominion must be fast depopulating. But the census, and our senses, prove that, that is not the fact.

Mr. Lowe, Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, in his report to the Minister proves how falsely and absurdly exaggerated are the statistics of the Bureau. He shows in the first place, by quoting from the "Grand Trunk" and "Great Western" returns that the Bureau has greatly overrated the total numbers of passengers crossing from Canada into the United States.

Fredericton Historical Society.

The second quarterly meeting of the Fredericton Historical Society, took place in the library of the Normal School, last Thursday, at 8 o'clock.

The paper gave a sketch of the war of 1812, between Great Britain and the United States, and an interesting account of the arduous mid-winter march, on snow shoes, of a portion of the 104th Regiment, from Fredericton to Quebec, in 1813, to take part in the war then being waged on Canadian soil, and in Canadian waters.
