Emigration From Canada. If the figures given by the Bureau of statistics, Washington, of the emigration from Canada to the United States, were correct, the Dominion must be fast depopulating. But the census, and our senses, prove that, that is not the fact. The statement made by the Bureau, is that the total emigration from Canada, during the year, ending June 30th, 1871 was 225,391. But how does the Burcan arrive at these figures? By taking the haphazard figures of the Collectors of Customs, at Port Huron, the chief point where passengers enter the United States from Canada, and at Sarnia, whose officers never attempt to take anything like an accurate account of the west bound passengers who

cross the border at these points, or to ascertain whence they came, whether the greater proportion are not Americans returning to their own country through Canada, or emigrants from abroad passing through it to thes Western States, and taking no stock of the contrary movement of the numbers of passengers entering Canada from the States and bound for the East. Mr. Lowe, Secretary of the Department o

Agriculture, in his report to the Minister proves how falsely and absurdly exaggerated are the statistics of the Bureau. He show in the first place, by quoting from the Grand Trunk" and "Great Western" retains that the Bureau has greatly overstated the total numbers of passengers crossing from Canada into the United States. These re turns give 85,920, as against 125,291 by the Bureau. But from the 85,920 must be deducted, 45,992 passengers from Europe via Quebec to the Western States, immigrants from eastern Canada to north western Canada, and from eastern United States to north west Canada, and to western United States, making a total of 32,928, only, instead of 125,920. But the Bureau does not take into account the number of passengers moving from the west to the east. The true emigration as Mr. Lowe observes, is the difference between the east bound and the west nd passengers. We need not give all the figures and calculations by which he arrives at the result, but he proves that the difference between the numbers going west, and those going east, was only 4,259 in favor of the former, and from that 4,259 he holds that a considerable number must be deducted of emigrants from the old countries bound for the Western States, who entered Canada, and went directly, or after remaining a while in the country to their destination.
