Dr. C. A. McQueen, son of Hon. A. McQueen of Point de Bute, has recently graduated from Jefferson Medical College, carrying off the highest honors in large classes.

Commencing to-morrow the Western Train will leave this city at 9 A. M., instead of 9:15 A. M., as formerly. The trains for St. John will be as usual at 7 A. M., and 2:15 P. M.

Messrs. Taylor and Thompson, of Sheffield, have been awarded the contract for erecting the proposed new bridge across the Hammonds River in King's Co. The price is \$75,000.

Edwin Street, of Burton, Sunbury Co., was very seriously injured one day last week while unloading logs, one of which fell on him, injuring him severely in the back and internally.

Mr. Edward Jack, C. E., delivered an entertaining lecture in the class room of St. Paul's Church, Tuesday evening, subject: "The Conquest of Constantinople by the Crusaders."

The paint and whitewash recently applied to the buildings at Carleton Place, between Rainford & Black and Queen & George Streets, has materially improved the appearance of that locality.

The generous subscription of four thousand dollars has been added to the list for rebuilding the Baptist Church by Mr. A. F. Randolph, who was absent from home when the old church was destroyed.

Prof. Max Sterne and his lady have taken up their residence at the pleasant village of Marsville. The choir of the Methodist Church there, which embraces excellent musical ability, will be the services of the services under the Professor's control.

Councillor Currie of Stanley, who was in town yesterday, informs us that there are large quantities of snow yet in the country. The farmers however are anticipating a good season, and the people of Stanley are talking of election prospects.

Sheriff Temple's very handsome barouche, which was stored during the winter in one of the sheds adjoining the Exhibition Building was mutilated by some miscreants who cut and slashed the cushions, and then wrenched the handles off the door.

A double tenement house belonging to the estate of the late James Mara, on King Street, was slightly injured by fire, at noon on Tuesday. The started with a fire from the Hook and Ladder Company, and responded very quickly to the alarm. The loss is covered by insurance in the Commercial Union, Mr. J. L. Inches, agent.

William Craig's house on the Cross Road, leading from College Road to the New Maryland highway, was entirely destroyed by fire Saturday evening. She swore that she was married in Boston by Rev. Mr. Seymour in 1870. She was remanded to prison till Saturday next.

The New Brunswick Historical Society are perfecting arrangements for a musical and literary entertainment on the 18th of May next, the 39th anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists. The choir will be taken by His Honor the Lieut. Governor. The musical department will be in charge of Mr. Peiser. The object is to awaken an interest in the Centennial year.

"Hands all Round," Mr. Tamson's new national hymn, has been set to music. His Honor the Lieut. Governor received a copy from the author, through the Secretary of the Royal Colonial Institute, and forwarded it to Mr. J. H. Williamson, leader of the Fredericton Brass Band, who is arranging it for the Band, by whom it will be played on Her Majesty's birthday.

Parish Court jurisdiction has been enlarged in debt to \$50 and torts to \$32. There seems to be very little need of County Courts at present at St. John.
