POLITICAL NEWS AND GOSSIP.

The Approaching Dominion and Local Elections. Sir Chas. Tupper has been making a triumphal tour of Cumberland Co. He will be returned unopposed.

The Grits claim the certain defeat of Mr. Irvine, in Carleton. Hon. Mr. Lindsay will have a big majority.

Mr. Girouard, the Conservative Candidate in Kent, is opposed by Mr. Geo. V. Macinerney, but he will be elected by a rousing majority.

Success seems certain for the whole Liberal Government ticket in Westmorland. Hon. Messrs. Landry and Hannington, Mr. Humphrey and Dr. Black.

Hon. Mr. Fraser has met with a most hearty reception in every Parish he has visited. The indications are that he will poll a magnificent vote, and be triumphantly elected.

In the Dominion election in Sunbury, in 1878, Mr. Chas. Borgee was a candidate in the Conservative ticket, by only forty-one votes. The vote will be reversed this time.

The opponents of Hon. Mr. Fraser, have failed to bring forward a single charge against him during his recent tour of political canvass, and now even in the heat and excitement of an election they are unable to do so.

Hon. Mr. Fraser will have a splendid majority in the city of York, and we think it will not be less than two hundred, but our country friends will beat that. We confidently expect he will poll more votes than Pickard and Fisher combined.

Hon. Peter Mitchell, in Northumberland, and Hon. John Costigan in Victoria, both Conservatives, and the latter gentleman a Cabinet Minister, will not be opposed. This is rather rough on the Banner Liberal Province, as Grits delight in terming New Brunswick.

Mr. Pickard has represented York in the Commons for fourteen years, receiving in that time \$14,000 for sessional allowances, besides a large sum for travelling and incidental expenses, amounting in all to nearly \$20,000. The electors want to know what return he has made for this.

When the responsible Editor of the Reporter gets through with his canvass of York County and returns to his editorial chair, we will be prepared to show him the names of those who have taken, in the mean time, to decline putting the half-witted mad shift, that is now doing duty for the absent editor.

The personal canvass is the only one Mr. Pickard's friends use to secure his election. It is about played out. Mr. J. S. Thompson, Mr. Pickard is a worthy man, but he has been run on that issue too long. The electors of York want a representative of recognized ability, and such an one they will have in Hon. Mr. Fraser.

Mr. Geo. McLeod, Sir Leonard Tilley's opponent in St. John, was a candidate in Kent in 1878, and polled only 610 out of over 2,000 votes cast, and yet it is in Kent that Mr. McLeod carries on an immense lumber business. It is folly to suppose that he stands the slightest chance of defeating Mr. Fraser in St. John, where he is merely a resident.

Mr. Geo. E. Gregory, an ambitious local barriester, is stamping the country in Mr. Pickard's interest, but really in his own. Mr. Pickard's friends do not forget Mr. Gregory's attempts to shove Mr. Pickard aside during Mr. Blake's visit. It is time enough for Mr. Gregory to face defeat when Mr. Pickard is disposed of by the electors.

Hon. B. R. Stevenson and Hon. A. H. Gillmor are facing each other in the Dominion contest in Charlotte. Sir Leonard Tilley paid the County a visit on Monday, and was most enthusiastically received. Our advice is that Mr. Lyvott and Hon. John Macadam will be returned to the local. There are twelve candidates in the field, with the Islands yet to be heard from.

Mr. Pickard's organ hopes to secure that gentleman's election by manufacturing a slur for him. It is a poor canvass in York. Mr. Pickard's opponents have never accused him of any crime; they do not conduct their canvass by the propagation of vile slanders, but rely on the justness of their cause.

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Every vote cast for Mr. Fisher will be thrown away, as he acknowledges certain defeat. It means more. Every vote thrown for him helps Mr. Pickard to victory. Will trust Liberal-Conservative aid and abet an enemy?

The party that would stoop to such contemptible canvasses are being used by Mr. Pickard's friends as a bad way, indeed. Their attempt to prejudice the temperance people by the circulation of the report so summarily contradicted elsewhere by Warden Close and Mr. John Black, President and Secretary of the Liberal-Conservative Committee is certainly beneath contempt, and must result on their own heads.

The friends of Messrs. Colter and Wetmore met Monday evening in a most friendly and amicable manner, and expect their men to lead the poll by hundreds. Mr. Blair's "plumbers" will not be so plentiful as in '78, and Mr. Thompson is nowhere in the contest. The Reporter, a paper that Fred. Fisher is meeting with every encouragement in the country.
