Declaration Day.

N. B. Fisheries.

Inspector Venning, in his report for New Brunswick on the Fisheries Statements for 1881, just received, gives, in the whole, a rather discouraging account of the state and prospects of the salmon, sad, herring, mackerel, lobster, and oyster fisheries in this Province.

Some portions of the Pacific Railway—the western sections—may be easy, but neither so easy or cheap as some of the anti-Pacific Syndicate men try to make out; but there are others that present gigantic difficulties in the way, and the work on which is exceptionally costly.
