Inspector Venning, in his report for New Brunswick on the Fisheries Statements for 1881, just received, gives, in the whole, a rather discouraging account of the state and prospects of the salmon, shad, herring, mackerel, lobster, and oyster fisheries in this Province. The salmon catch in 1881 was per cent. below what it was in former years. and says that the excessive net fishing, everybut only desire to call your attention to where seen, is the plain, visible, sufficient cause of the decrease.
