The Exhibition.

The weather has been most propitious for the Exhibition and all other outward circumstances equally favorable.

The outside attractions in St. John were varied and interesting. The Centennial tree planting one day last week attracted a great crowd.

The Exhibition season was one of harvest for the business houses, whose character and appearance are a source of wonder and pride to the people.

The closing ceremonies of the Exhibition will take place to-morrow.

The Policy of Dismissal.

The alleged reform government of Mr. Blair was to do great things for the country, they were to cut down expenditures, save the country thousands of dollars by economy in the public service, and do away with all manner of official abuses.

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But there was a step beyond which even the Executive could not go. We are told, and the assertion has been not squarely denied, that at the recent meeting of the Government, the St. John faction pressed vigorously for their share of the spoils.

The whole plan, we are credibly advised, was arranged: the appointments so far as the Executive could make them, were made, and all that remained was to secure the signature of the Lieutenant Governor to the outrage.

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"Stepped in profligacy from the Legislature to the Poor House," were the words of Rev. Mr. Lane recently in referring to Halifax. His words are being partially verified.

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The Westmorland Election.

On Saturday next, the electors of Westmorland will have the opportunity of giving their decision at the polls on the issues raised in that constituency, as between Mr. Wells, and Mr. Killam, in their contest for the vacant seat in the Assembly.

We regret that this issue has not been clearly laid down on local questions alone, and that extraneous matters have been drawn into the contest, by which the people, in a measure, will be precluded from pronouncing their verdict on the acts of the Local Government, which, though it has been in power only a few months, has shown sufficient incapacity, bitter partisanship, mismanagement, and evidence of its shabby declarations while in opposition, to justify its being cast aside for men who better know, and can better administer the public affairs of the Province.

But the contest will not be altogether free from local influences. There is in the field a gentleman who shoulders the full responsibility of the Government's policy, if it can be dignified by that name. Mr. Killam is a servile follower of the Blair Government. He has appealed to Westmorland on its behalf, and if elected, will lead the seek long as his own personal ambitions are gratified. On the other hand, Mr. Wells, a young man of talent, education, and popularity, seeks the seat, presumably in antagonism to the present regime, but not in opposition to economy and true reform in the public service, and in this Mr. Wells should be supported.

Notwithstanding the auspicious circumstances attending the Exhibition, there was much to awaken hostile criticism and induce adverse comment, but it must be a source of pleasure to our people, that, with all the mismanagement and incapacity shown by the Commission, the occasion has been one that will very greatly benefit New Brunswick abroad.

It is expected, says the Montreal Gazette, that the Dominion Parliament will be called together about the 15th of January and that Sir Charles Tupper will be home from England to take his seat.

There are according to the Manitoba papers, seven hundred untried cases before the courts of the Province. As a result the Law Society has urged the appointment of an additional judge selected from the bar of the Province.

During September 10,308 immigrants arrived in Canada, making 154,752 so far since the 1st of January, against 143,253 in the same period of last year. Of this year's arrivals 91,773 remained in Canada, and 63,980 went to the United States.

The chief superintendent of works of the Panama Canal Company has submitted reports indicating that that canal will be completed in 1888. Subscriptions will be opened on October 3 for 60,000 obligations of 500 francs each at 25 francs.

The site of the monument to be erected to the memory of President Garfield in the Lake View Cemetery at Cleveland has been selected. It comprises two acres and a half, and is on a bluff overlooking the Erie, being the highest ground along the shore.
