

The second, repeatedly immersed in a solution of saltpetre, and a third in one of boracic acid, exhibited little indications of inconvenience. Bisulphide of carbon produced instant death when applied to the worm, though its fumes were not effectual. The fumes of benzine as well as the liquid caused almost instant death, but when applied to the cabbages small whitish excresences appeared on the leaves. Hot We have often advocated early mawater applied to the cabbage destroyed a portion of the worms, causing the leaves to turn yellow. One ounce of saltpetre and two pounds of commenter says the Maine Farmer, to the mon sait dissolved in three gallons of water formed an application which was partly sufficient. The most satisfactory remedy tested, however, consisted of a mixture of one half pound each of lard and soap and kerosene oil in three gallons of water. This was applied Aug. 26; an examination the following day showed many, if not all, the worms destroyed.
