John Pickard is dead, but his memory will live in the hearts of the people whom he served. The end was not unexpected nor at the last, unwelcome to the spirit set free. For months Mr. Pickard has been an invalid, for years he has suffered from a chronic affection which developed and strengthened till it assumed a type of con-MOCCASINS, strengthened the it assumed a type of consumption, against the ravages of which few struggle with success. Mr. Pickard was a strong man, a man of great vitality, else, long ere this, the fatal disease would have carried him off. The seeds of disease were soon in him by exposure and neglect, which avoided, he would in all human probability have yet been a man strong in stature and not a lifeless piece of clay.

> Last winter and spring Mr. Pickard attended his Parliamentary duties at Ottawa. but when he returned home in May, his friends were pained to observe a marked change in his appearance. His face gave indication of the struggle that had, in reality, begun within, though his manner had lost little of its buoyancy. To the writer soon after his return, he spoke of his physical weakness, but hoped that change and rest would restore his strength and vigor. During the summer he drove out frequently, but his business matters were attended to at home. As the Autumn approached, however, there came evidences of a change, and long before he became altogether confined, those who knew him intimately, felt that his end was near. His physician advised a change of climate for the winter, and his arrangements were made to visit Southern California. Feeling better during the Exhibition at St. John in October, he visited that city, where, however, he was taken ill more seriously than before, and from that time it became apparent that he would never be able to go abroad. Since then, his decline has been slow but sure, and when on Monday morning at eight o'clock he breathed his last breath, surrounded by his faithful wife and friends, it was no surprise to those who were aware of the character of his disease, nor to the public who

> But the way soon opened to a higher position as representative. Mr. Fisher sat only one session in the Commons, when his elevation to the bench left a vacancy in York. The election to fill this occurred in 1868, when Mr. Pickard was returned by acclamation to represent York in the House Commons, at Ottawa, taking his seat during the session of 1869. His political career since that time is well-known to the majority of our readers. In the general election of 1872, and again in 1874, when Parliament had been dissolved by the McKenzie Government, Mr. Pickard was re-elected by acclamation, not because of his party feeling, not because of any political creed he may have possessed, but because of great personal influence. He had conducted an extensive lumber business; almost every voter in the County was personally known to him, and personally respected him; he had given liberally, as he always gave, to every appeal made on behalf of worthy objects; he had and all these considerations united to make his popularity and his influence something impossible to overcome. Mr. Pickard subsequently was in partnership with D. F.
