Canada mingles her adieu to Lord Lorne and the Princess, with her hearty chorus of welcome to their successors, Lord and Lady Lansdowne.

The past few weeks have been a time of gaiety and merrymaking, not unmixed, however, with a tinge of sadness and regret, among the people of the leading cities of Ontario and Quebec.

But with the words of farewell on their lips, the Canadian people turn to welcome the strangers to our shores. Lord Lansdowne and his party arrived at Quebec on Monday, and surrounded by the Federal Ministry, the Judges of the Supreme Court, and other dignitaries of Church and State in the ancient Capital, yesterday, the new Governor General took the oath of office, and is now occupying the vice regal residence at Ottawa, which was warmly welcomed him.

The city of Montreal banqueted Sir Hector Langvin, Minister of Public Works, at the Windsor Hotel, Thursday night, and the gathering is said to have been the largest, the most influential, and most representative affair of the kind ever seen in Canada.

The Toronto Globe in commenting on recent Halifax scandals, comes to the conclusion that western churches will have to send missionaries down to the city by the sea.

The Grand Jury of Halifax, failed to find a bill against Dr. Lawson, for murder, and on their return to the Court Room, were soundly lectured by Judge Thompson.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The total receipts of the Dominion Exhibition amount to \$18,735.

The Massachusetts gubernatorial election will be held on the 6th of November. It seems almost certain that General Butler will be re-elected.

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The memorandum, adopted by the Executive Council of Queensland and the Union of New Guinea, and transmitted to the Home Government, points out that the expense to be incurred would not be great; that it was absolutely necessary to prevent the island falling into the hands of some foreign power; and to establish some recognized authority in it, capable of dealing with lawless adventurers.

Two strangers were arrested in Halifax, last week, for having values in their possession containing a powerful species of dynamite and the government of Halifax, and the military authorities felt sure the mysterious men were followers of O'Donovan Rossa, who intended to blow the city into smithereens.

There was a sad scene in a Court Room at Sarnia, Ontario, last week, when a young girl was arraigned on a charge of murdering her illegitimate child, by placing it in an old and unused cistern where it was drowned.

At the Hudson Fishery Exhibition, Canada obtained gold medals for the best collection of cured fish, shrimps, fish, salmon, trout, and sea trout.

Dr. W. L. Goodwin, who was personally known to many of our citizens, a few years ago, while attending the Normal School, has just been installed Professor of Chemistry in Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario.

There are at present on the roll of that Province 147 barristers, of whom only fifty-seven were admitted from 1872 up to February, 1881, when the number of Ontario men began to increase.

GENERAL NEWS.

A bill granting women suffrage has passed the Washington Territory legislature.

The Winnipeg Times urges upon farmers to sow red fytz wheat in preference to any other kind.

The question of what becomes of pins has often been mooted, but never answered. Yet it certainly is peculiar that an article of everyday use which is manufactured in enormous quantities, and disappears in equal proportion. It is estimated that no less than 50,000,000 pins are daily manufactured in England and Dublin, and that in this country 37,000,000 are produced in Birmingham alone, thus leaving 13,000,000 for the production of Dublin, Stroud, and London.
