Feathering his Nest.

If there were an "Independence of Parliament" Act on the local statute book, Hon. T. F. Gillespie, we think, would be subject to its penalties. Mr. Gillespie, among his multifarious businesses, includes that of fire insurance. In this city, the Government has a large amount of insurable property including Government House, the Parliament Buildings, the public offices, the Legislative Library, etc.

Our contemporary in the same article, in which it settles the Governorship, proceeds with its affidavits and always unshaken plan of demolishing Government House, doing away with the Governor's private secretary, and suggesting other such radical reforms, all of which had a place in Mr. Blair's now famous opposition platform of 1881, but of which now the leader of the Government makes no mention. We suspect it is not Government House and its expenditures that so frequently excite the Globe's attacks, but the British flag, which the editor observes floating from its staff on the grounds, when he accepts the hospitality of the Governor.

A Theological Dispute

The Presbyterians of Montreal have been discussing a difference of opinion on certain doctrinal points held by Rev. J. E. Hill, a new and eloquent clergyman of that denomination recently set over St. Andrew's Church in that city, and Principal McViear, President of the Presbyterian Theological Hall, Mr. Hill, it appears, delivered a lecture before the divinity students and under the auspices of the faculty, in which he expressed what are alleged to be heretical opinions regarding future punishment, which Principal McViear then and there repudiated for himself and the faculty. The affair created a sensation at the time and has been the talk of the denomination since. Mr. Hill on being interviewed on the subject, said that the whole trouble arose from differences between himself and Principal McViear. The latter believes that a severe punishment will be inflicted upon sinners after death, that the punishment is penal, and therefore unending, while he held that although there may be a severe punishment, and even that it may be everlasting, yet there is nothing in the text of Scripture to show that it is so. A difference between us is of the most absurd description. He thinks that punishment after death is eternal, and I believe that this is remedial. Principal McViear dissenting from Mr. Hill's views said:—"For myself and for the members of our faculty I desire to say that we have reached different results on the question discussed before you, and must not be understood as endorsing the personal views of the lecturer, of which we had no previous knowledge. I regret that he had not taken occasion to make them known prior to his appearance among us, so as not to compromise us, especially as the subject was voluntarily offered to him, and in no way prescribed by our faculty as the only one he might discuss."

Editorial Comment.

The order enforcing the discontinuance of the razor in the army, has led to some unpleasantness among the officers of the Halifax garrison. One of the officers stationed there who is said to be very wealthy, refused to allow his beard to grow, and for his disobedience was imprisoned for three days, and in consequence of this he has decided to purchase his discharge and retire from the service. Mr. D. Maxwell, C. E., has concluded the survey of the proposed route of the Miramichi Valley Railway, and laid his plans and estimates before the president, Mr. Gibson, and the directors. There is still an agitation in Northumberland regarding the terminus, but we believe the difficulty will be amicably arranged, and the work of construction undertaken as soon as spring opens. The Stus says that already, the company have ordered fifty thousand dollars worth of rails.

Twice Hanged.

About twelve hundred people gathered in an open field three-quarters of a mile distant from the jail at Innesville, Georgia, on the 30th ult., and witnessed one of the most hideous spectacles ever enacted on a gibbet in a square built out of coal complexion, who murdered a negro named James Monroe on the 17th of last September. An old grudge was made a farewell speech, in which he lashed and threats of murder on both sides were of frequent occurrence. On the night of the crime West hid himself in the shade of a tree near the post, and when the executioner came dealt him a blow on the back of the head with an ax. West then jumped on his victim, and held the face and head, and ended his diabolical work by plunging his scull into a snail's mass with the maul. Monroe never spoke, and West fled, but was captured, tried, and convicted. He was hanged on the 17th ult.

Politics in Ontario.

Ontario, politically, is being intensely excited over the election in West Middlesex, which occurs on Friday. The election is to fill a vacancy in both the Local and Dominion Parliaments but the interest mainly centres in the former, in which Ontario's new Minister of Education, Hon. G. W. Ross, is a candidate. The constituency is being stamped by the local Ministers and by Mr. Blake and other members of the Dominion Parliament. Mr. Ross is being mercilessly criticized by the Conservative press, which object to him as wanting in sufficient education for such an important position, and as having been while Inspector of Schools in the employ and pay of a firm of book publishers. The Mowat Government is also being badly used up for the shabby manner in which Mr. Crooks, the late Minister of Education, has been treated by them. It was published that Mr. Crooks, who has been suffering from physical and mental malady, had resigned his position, and the Royal Gazette announced his resignation, which Mr. Crooks promptly denied. The official sheet then took back the announcement, and one appeared in its stead, gazetted Mr. Crooks as dismissed. Mr. Crooks is expected will be able to take his seat when the Legislature meets, and will go into opposition because of the unfair way in which he has been thrust from office. The Ontario Government is weak in the Legislature, and with Mr. Crooks's change of base, and the possible defeat of Mr. Ross with two other Government candidates in Simcoe and Cardwell, the probability of the latest termination of Mowat's rule in Ontario would seem assured.

Attorney General Miller of Manitoba and Mr. Mowat, leader of the Ontario Government, have been in consultation with regard to settlement of the Boundary Dispute, and it has been decided to refer the whole matter to the English Privy Council.

President Arthur in his message to Congress recently opened at Washington, congratulated the nation upon the favorable aspect of domestic and foreign affairs of the Government, and recommends to its fostering care, the fishery interests. He thinks revision on the subject of pauper emigration from Europe, necessary. He does not advise any measures for diminution of national revenues, but urges improvement of coast defenses, and that increase in naval strength for the protection of American harbors, honor and commercial interests. He disapproves of the proposed governmental control of telegraph lines, and advocates assumption by the national legislature of the territory of Utah as the best means of crushing polygamy.

We have received the first number of the Week, the new literary journal published at Toronto, and edited by Mr. C. G. D. Roberts. In appearance, it resembles the late Montreal Spectator. Its table of contents includes topics of the week, by the editor, in which political and social matters are discussed fearlessly and independently; contributed articles, in which Goldwin Smith writes of current events and opinions, and J. E. Collins supplies a lengthy article on International Copyright; Literature embraces a poetic selection and a serial by Edgar Fawcett; Music and the drama receive attention, and book notices, literary gossip, and a chronicle of the week, make up a good, substantial and interesting literary dish. The typographical appearance of the Week is very striking, and if succeeding numbers of the publication are made as interesting as the one already on our table, the success of the new journal would seem assured.
