York and the New Cabinet.

Lumber Operations.

The *Chicouticou Post*, last issue, says that the past three months have been remarkably favorable to operations in the lumber woods. It gives an estimate of the winter's logging, so far, of operations, large and small, over seventy in number, in the parishes or districts of Botford, Westmorland, Seckville, Dorchester, Shediac, Moncton, Salisbury, County of Westmorland, N. B.,—in all 10,250,000 feet, and in the County of Cumberland, N. S., where at Westchester, River Phillip, Northport, and Maccaw, 31,579,588 feet will be cut, and find an outlet, aggregating 44,879,000 feet.
