nouncing that the new Military Schoel for the Maritime Provinces, to be established this Autumn, will be located in this city, and that at least one hundred men of the Canadian standing army, will be stationed here in connection therewith, the whole to be under the command of Lieut. Col. Maunsell, late Deputy Adjutant General, for New Brunswick. Ever since provision was made at the last session of Parliament for this new departure, we are led to believe, that strong pressure has been brought to bear upon the Government by almost every town of importance in the Maritime Provinces, to secure the school and its attendants, St. John particularly urging its claims with peculiar force, but the Minister of Militia, Hon. Mr. Caron, and the Government, recognizing the facilities this city already possesses, for all the necessities of the institution, justly conceded our claims, and the result is as we have stated. The establishment of the school, and the organization of a permanent military force here, means a large addition to our population; it means an expenditure annually of thousands of dollars, and it will give our own young men an opportunity, if they wish, of entering the military service, and furnishes them the means of procuring, if they desire that only, a military education. All classes will cordially welcome Col. Maunsell again in our midst. Death of Sir Albert J. Smith

Sir Albert J. Smith, after an illness extending over the past year, died at his residence, Dorchester, on Sunday evening. He was born in Westmorland County in 1822, educated at the County Grammar School and married in June, 1863, the daughter of J. W. Young, Esq., of Halifax, N. S. He was called to the bar of New Brunswick in 1847. In 1852, he was elected to the Legislature for Westmorland County, was a member of the Executive Council from 1856 to 1863. whed he retired from the government. He held the same office in his own administration in 1865. He was delegrate to England with the late Judge Fisher in 1858 on the subject of the Intercolonial Railway; to the same country with the present Chief Justice Allen on public business in 1865, and to Washington with Hon. Messrs. Galt (now Sir A. T .. ) Howland and Henry on the subject of reciprocal trade, January, 1866. He sat in the Local Legislature until Confederation, when he was elected to the Honse of Commons in 1867, and continued to represent that county until last year, when he

was defeated by the present member, Mr Wood. He was sworn of the Privy Council and appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 7th Movember, 1873, and in 1877 represented Canada before the Fisheries Commission, being knighted for his services in that connexion. The remains of the deceased gentleman were interred at Dorchester vesterday afternoon.
