If young plantations set last spring, keep thoroughly worked out, and if intended for fruit only pick off the the first runners that sprout out, thus giving vigor and strong growth to the set plants. Then allow the runners to grow out, and by keeping the cultivator going afterwards the runners may be kept thrown along in close rows. Some, however, allow and form very thick matted vines our general practice. To grow in stools or hills, keep all runners thus cut off, a crown is formed on the old plant which puts forth one or twomatted row. However, we do not advise it for large plantations. A very good way to force plants

into a strong growth is to sprinkle over them water from barn yard, being careful not to put it on too
