

A New Wheat Insect. Prof. S. A. Forbes, State Entomologist of Illinois, calls attention to a new insect enemy of winter wheat, which has lately come a notice in central and southern lawis. It has done most serious mischief in various localities. Heretofore it has been confounded with the Hessian fly, and much of the damage that is supposed to have occured from the ravages of the fly has been largely due to the wheat bulb-worm. It is a smooth, slender, pale green grub, about onefourth of an ingh in length. It burrows in the base of the stem of the wheat, just above the root. A single insect can destroy an entire stool, and there is abundant evidence that the Hellebore or Paris Green after the worm leaves one stalk for another, The worms hatch in the field in the fall, and occasion the principal part of the injury before severe frosts occur. "In three years," says a practical fruit-grower, "I improved the productions of my fruit trees from 15 to 200 bushels by treating them in the following manner: I first reduced the top one-fourth, then in the fall I plowed the soil as well as I could, it being row toward the trees. As I worked from them I let the plow fall a little lower, and when between the trees I allowed the plow to run deep, so that the water would settle away from them in the spring. I hauled a fair quality of coarse manure, pulverized it well and marked out hills, manurbeans and pumpkins. The following spring I repeated the same cultivation. that fall I harvested 70 bushels of and planted to potatoes, which were very large, but rotted badly. I made Moncton, N. He procured a number of boards and placed them here and there among his potatoes, and on these boards were placed raw potatoes sliced. At noon on the first day of his experiment, he and his hired man found every piece of potato covered with bugs. The man killed his crop. and at night another crop was killed, though not so large, and in a week not a bug could be seen, and his trouble with the bugs after this was comparatively small. In the spring he says, is the best time to attend to bugs, as a spring bug, he understands, breeds from two to three hundred during the potato season.
