ing of St. John by the Loyalists, was carried out most successfully last Friday, and it is estimated that over ten thousand strangers visited the commercial metropolis on that day. The success of the celebration was far beyond what the most sanguine expected, and indeed, we believe if it had been generally understood abroad, that the affair would assume magnificent proportions, the attend-

ance of visitors would have been nearly doubled. The gathering was thoroughly representative of the Maritime Provinces, and Black Silks, Satins, Brocade, the demonstration throughout was marked by an enthusiasm and good management, which could not fail to reflect the greatest credit upon the loval citizens of St. John Scotia and P. E. Island, who entered heartily into the day's proceedings.

> The celebration really began on Thursday evening, when a splendid gathering met in Trinity Church, an historic spot, and listened to addresses from His Honor the Lieut. Governor, who presided, from Mr. J. W. Laurance, our most gifted historical speaker and writer, Judge Skinner and other prominent gentlemen. The Rector of Trinity, Rev. Mr. Brigstock, preached an eloquent sermon, suitable to the occasion, and the services otherwise were most appropriate, closing at midnight, when the immense congregation as one man, rose to their feet and sang the National Anthem, while the booming of cannons ushered in the second century of the city's existence.

The London Fisheries' Exhibition.

The great international exhibition of the isheries was inaugurated on the 12th inst., by the Prince of Wales on behalf of her Majesty, whose health did not permit her to be present. All the princes of the blood royal, with the princesses, assisted at the brilliant pageant which added this interesting exhibition to the shows of London. The admission to the vast galleries for the open-

ing ceremony was only granted to holders of tickets and invited guests. The gathering was extraordinarily picturesque. A vast dark mass of Londoners formed the background of the brilliant scarlet, blue, and gold uniforms of the military and naval officers. Here and there along the line stood out in bold relief a picked body of thirty Yeomen of the Guard, vulgarly known as Beefeaters, in their quaint costume of Henry VIII.'s time, in scarlet coats, breeches, and stockings gold embroidered with the English rose, crown, and royal cypher, surmounted by black velvet hats and betasselled halberts.
