In the markets, however, a great deal depends upon the looks of poultry in order to made quick sales at good prices. Scalding, it must be admitted, spoils the appearance of poultry intended for market, so that it becomes necessary to pluck market poultry dry, if the best prices are expected to be obtained. That may be, unquestionally is, a mere matter of taste on the part of the buyers, but tastes are not to be disputed, and hence must be complied with.
