In reply to the statements of the opposition that the tariff would not be effective as a protective tariff, he showed that in cotton alone the increase of importation of the raw material during 1882-83 was 3,482,020 Hides and pelts were imported in 1877-78 to the value of \$1,207,300, and in 1882-83 to the value of \$1,963,744, showing pretty clearly there has been a large extension in the manufacture of leather of various kinds. In 1878 the value of machinery imported for manufacturing purposes was \$438,037, and in 1883 it had increased to \$2,757,570. In 1878, the imports of coal amounted to Not only has the effect of the protective tar-892,446 tons, and in 1883 to 1,086,817 tons, showing an increase of 794,371 tons, while the increased consumption of Canadian coal in 1883 over 1878 was 700,000 tons, making a total increased consumption of 1,493,371 tons over 1878. With regard to woollen goods, Sir Leonard was able to show that turers. they are sold to-day lower than under the tariff of 1878, and the same with regard to cottons. The value of imports too had decreased from an average per head during the five years between 1874 and 1878, inclusive, of \$27.14 to \$23.02 per head from 1878 to 1883, or a total decrease of \$16,000,000. In 1873, the value was \$33.58 per head and in

1883, if the imports per head of the population had been the same we would have had \$152,000,000 of imports instead of \$122,-000,000-making a difference of \$30,000,000 during the year. Robertson, Inspectors of Inland Fisheries in this Province, have submitted to the Government an interesting report of their visit to the principal fishing grounds in New Brunswick, during the past summer. Both gentlemen are veterans with the rod and their familiarity with these grounds rendered their task an easy one, and the information they were able to lay before the Government most reliable.

After a detailed description of the Rivers they visited, the Inspectors set forth the great pecuniary benefit that is derived by the people in those districts from the gentlemen who frequent the fishing grounds each season. The statistics which the Inspectors give are interesting :-
