The Speech and the Debate thereon.

The Lieut. Governor's speech at the opening of the Session, which we print elsewhere, is a beautifully worked document, but barren in practical merit. There are a great many matters referred to, but the language is so indefinite, the meaning so hazy, that we forbear discussing them till the measures promised are submitted to the House.

The Budget Speech.

We are able to touch on only a few points in the magnificent speech delivered in the House of Commons on Friday by Sir Leonard Tilley on the financial question. In vindication of the tariff and its results, Sir Leonard pointed out that the average annual export of foreign goods from Canada during the four years from 1876 to 1879 was \$7,460,712, while during the four following years from 1880 to 1883, it amounted to \$9,099,971.

Salmon Fishing in New Brunswick.

Messrs. J. Henry Phair and C. A. Robertson, Inspectors of Island Fisheries in this Province, have submitted to the Government an interesting report of their visit to the principal fishing grounds in New Brunswick, during the past summer. Both gentlemen are veterans with the rod and their familiarity with these grounds rendered their task an easy one, and the information they were able to lay before the Government most reliable.

Mr. Phair has shown us the advance sheets of a guide book he purposes issuing, on our inland fisheries, if the Legislature will grant the necessary pecuniary assistance for its printing and distribution.

A Dumb Government.

In the debate on the address in the Assembly, only one member of the government, Attorney General Blair spoke. There may be two reasons for the silence of the other members of the government, one that they do not feel themselves competent to address the House with any degree of force, or another, that the Attorney General arrogates to himself the sole control of the Executive, so far as its public utterances are concerned.

Canada Before and Under the National Policy.

A representative of a leading New York Journal, has recently been investigating the condition of Canada since the introduction of the National Policy, and instituting a comparison of the Dominion's position before and since the protective tariff was introduced. The conclusions he has drawn, after interviewing exhaustively very many gentlemen who know whereof they spoke, is most flattering to the policy the present government has carried out, for the development of our resources, and in making this great country what it should be, "Canada for the Canadians."

The Estimates.

The following are the Estimates for the current year as laid on the table of the Assembly by the Provincial Secretary on Friday. These sums are exclusive of the amounts authorized by law.
