Every farmer's wife knows that it often happens that country stores get more butter than they want, yet if good butter is put up in the right condition they will often purchase yours when under other circumstances they would refuse to buy at all. Many a farmer in selling potatoes has suffered loss by mixing large and small all together; he got a low price by measure amount to but little, as they only fill up the spaces between the large ones, and they can far better be fed to stock than be allowed to damage the whole by being sold without proper sorting.
