The Bridge.

Was Mr. Blair or Mr. Wetmore right on the Bridge question? The Attorney General declared in the City Hall and in the Legislature, that the Crown, meaning of course the Local Government, had authority not submit to outside dictation, but locate the to construct the Bridge, regardless of the Stock Farm where it should be, at Spring-Dominion Parliament. He quoted alleged precedents for such a course, and declared that "what has been done, may be done, and shall be done. Mr. Wetmore on the other hand, has given his opinion that it will be necessary to seek legislation from the Federal Parliament, and because he has advised this course, he and his friends have been charged by one newspaper crank, with opposing the construction of the Bridge. Further than this, Mr. Temple's name has been introduced by the same parties, and he has been abused for having, as this irresponsible authority alleged, exerted his influence with the Dominion Government to embarrass the Local Government on the Bridge question. All these charges are the merest folly, manufactured to the order of Mr. Blair, and by his command, given to the country to injure his opponents, and to relieve him of some of the opposition his handling of this matter, has awakened.

There is a right way, and a wrong way of doing everything, and if Mr. Blair had chosen the former, possibly the bridge would have been a long way on towards construction at the present moment. Why did he not go to the Dominion Parliament at its last session, and secure the necessary legislation. We suppose it will be said in reply, that he did not believe it necessary to obtain Dominion legislation. Does Mr. Blair still believe so? And if he does, why is not the construction of the bridge pushed forward. Why is it that nearly the whole season has been lost. The Attorney General has made a laugh-

ing stock of himself before the country, on this bridge business. He has been trifling with the people of Fredericton and York, but they pretty well understand his position. The FARMER will be charged no doubt with attempting to embarass the Attorney General That is not true. We want the bridge built The people of this country demand it of Mr. Blair, but they want him to get it in a regular way. The FARMER of itself, is particularly interested in the erection of the bridge. It heard Mr. Blair was going to build a bridge from St. Mary's to Fredericton, landing in the city, at the foot of Carleton Street, and it at once moved down town and secured a location commanding that sport. Surely it is not because of this, that such slow progress is being made with the bridge. Surely Mr. Blair does not propose to effect a landing some place else, just because the FARMER has come down to superintend the work, and to tell the people when Mr. Blair is not going on with the construction, and when he is not proceeding regularly. Well if the bridge is to go on, why does it not go on. The people are tired of waiting. They are weary of seeing a dozen or more men, working on a contract that is to cost, say nearly \$100,000.
